FFI Issues Updated Guidance on COVID-19 & Safety

BY FLY FISHERS INTERNATIONAL IN ORGANIZATIONAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

The world has changed dramatically since March 16th when Fly Fishers International issued guidance on Covid-19 to members, clubs, and councils on official FFI meetings, events, and workshops. At the time, there was tremendous uncertainty about the trajectory of the pandemic, only a small handful of states had issued restrictions on activities, and the Center For Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) had just announced blanket guidance on a national level. FFI leadership felt it was the most responsible action to postpone or cancel official FFI events until further notice. We have learned a lot since then.

During the intervening time, states have taken varying approaches to deal with the pandemic, the outcomes of these distinctive measures have had differing effects, and there has been extreme variability on the impact to communities around the country and the world. CDC guidance has evolved to the point where it is now challenging to view blanket guidance as applicable to all states and communities around the country. It would not be reasonable to provide the same restrictions for rural Montana as metropolitan New York.

WHAT'S NEXT

So where do we go from here? We know that people are excited to get back together with friends at club and council meetings, spend time on the water, and enjoy social events, but we need to be cautious. FFI is now providing updated guidance that reflects the variability of circumstances based on geography, considers human health, and allows FFI members to find ways to safely engage within their communities.

- FFI clubs and councils must defer to health
 experts, following official, location-specific state and local
 regulations provided by respective health departments. This
 may include recommendations regarding acceptability and
 size of gatherings, travel restrictions, use of personal
 protective equipment, social distancing guidelines, and
 other precautions.
- It is further recommended that all FFI club and council event organizers wait at least 15 days from the announcement of relaxed restrictions to assess impacts before moving forward with activities. This allows time to assess whether these new restrictions adversely affect the Covid-19 case rate, and reduces the likelihood of planning an event only to cancel it due to adverse outcomes.
- FFI will continue with the current policy to cancel or postpone all international and centrally sponsored events through July 31 (International Expo, exam, and exam preparation events). Such events already scheduled after July 31st can be evaluated on a case by case basis, again deferring to local health and safety recommendations.

SAFETY RECOMMENDATIONS

Here are some additional safety recommendations regarding local fly fishing, casting, tying or administrative events:

- Please remember that all face to face gatherings carry risk, regardless of size, and assess that risk against the importance of the event. Airline travel to and from events may pose risk for many travelers and as well those in the destination community. Gatherings that can be accomplished by telephone and videoconferencing remain preferred.
- Please request that potential participants exclude themselves if they have or may have been exposed to Covid-19 within 2 weeks prior to the event, have a pending Covid-19 test, or have symptoms such as fever or cough.
- Practice social distancing of at least 6 feet apart from one another and wear facial coverings, even outside. Facial coverings really do reduce the spread of infectious respiratory droplets transmitted by speech (especially loud speech), cough and sneezing.
- Frequent hand washing, use of hand sanitizers, and disinfectant wipes are an important part of reducing infection.
- Equipment, such as fly rods, fly tying materials, etc. should not be shared. If gear is shared for some unavoidable reason, it and the user's hands should be disinfected after use with disinfectant wipes or 70% alcohol solution.
- Participants at gatherings should bring their own snacks, food, and water. If a meal must be served, individual packaging ("box lunch") is far safer than a buffet or "grab and go" scenario.

Trout Unlimited Guidance

Here's what Trout Unlimited recommends for responsible fishing, given what we know about the threats posed by the coronavirus outbreak and the COVID-19 disease:

- Practice appropriate social distancing. The Centers for Disease Control recommend keeping six feet between you and other people. We'll make it even easier — stay a rod's length apart.
- Wear a face covering when you come into contact with other anglers. A Buff or a mask can help keep you safe, and it's a sign of respect for others who are trying to stay healthy during these trying times.
- Avoid fishing from boats if you can it's tough to maintain social distance in a boat. If you must fish from a boat, remember to cover your nose and mouth with a mask or a gaiter.
- · Fish local. Stay close to home.
- Drive to the river separately if you're meeting a fishing buddy. Better yet, consider fishing alone (where that's safe, of course).
- If you don't feel well, or are running a temperature, it's best to stay home.

Notes from the Library September 2020

The evolution of an individual's education is as much out of necessity as desire. We all believed as young adults (teens) that our formal education would end, the sooner the better! Then we came to the realization that life is a continuous learning experience. Dr. Donald Dean, bio-chemistry and entomology professor emeritus from The Ohio State University has produced a website and atlas of aquatic invertebrates in Ohio that is an excellent reference for learning and understanding the insects, in every stage of their life cycle, that the fish population in Ohio are feeding on (www.ohioaguaticmacroinvertebrates.org). Dr. Dean is still active in stream monitoring and expanding information through publications and the website above. We are working to add to the library some well-illustrated study guides on "bugs" recommended by Dr. Dean. One easily read field book is J. Reese Voshell's A Guide to Common Freshwater Invertebrates of North America. If you tie flies or just want to understand their biological history and

purpose this guide will be one of those lifelong learning experiences not to miss.

We have dedicated an interior closet (4 x 3 x 9), with existing shelves that would make Jim Calvert proud, for the storage and organization of the MVFF library. Living in a condominium all space is precious. We have been asked at times about the donation and addition to the library of old magazine issues. The policy has been to extract unique articles and archive them for member use. Otherwise donated magazines are set out at the monthly meetings for other members to take and keep. Magazines then are passed on to PHWFF and other organizations for their distribution and use. Generally after two months any remaining magazines are disposed of due to storage limitations.

Looking forward we are hopeful that both the beginning and advanced fly tying classes will be held and we will take the library on the road making literature available at the class site.

We continue to have great interest in local river maps and will work diligently to keep them available. Check it out. J.W.

September Fly of the Month

F Fly

Recipe

Hook Dry, size 10 - 28 Thread Olive/Black 8/0

Body Olive/Black pheasant tail fibers Wing Natural gray/Olive CDC

Head Thread

1. Flatten the barb on the hook and put it in your vise. Tie in the thread behind the hook eye and wrap it back to the start of the hook bend, laying down a good thread base.

- 2. Select 4 pheasant tail fibers, align the tips, and tie them in at the hook bend with the tips extending out over the hook bend.
- 3. Slightly twist the fibers into a loose rope and wrap this rope up the shank of the hook to slightly behind the hook eye. Tie off the fibers and trim off any excess. Let the thread hang.
- 4. Select 2 CDC feathers and place them side by side. Align the tips of the feathers and tie them in tightly by their base right behind

the hook eye at the end of the pheasant tail body. Be sure to position the CDC feathers on their edges caddis style and ensure that the wing lies low over the body (see the picture). Trim off the excess CDC butts and cover them with thread wraps forming a small neat thread head.

5. Do a whip finish and cut the thread.

As an alternative head, after tying in the CDC feathers, trim the feather butts even with the front of the hook eye similarly to an elk hair caddis head. Whip finish behind this small fiber head, keeping the thread wraps on top of one another. Cut the thread and you're done.

An avid fly fisherman, he practices his casting skills in the middle of W. 12th Street early mornings avoiding traffic as though passing cars were over-hanging branches and mid-stream boulders. Targeting street signs and potholes, he practices for accuracy, style, and muscle memory rather than distance. Having a 30 x 100 yd. adjoining backlot I am inspired by Jon's intrepid, yet audacious choice of a practice field. Only once have I availed myself of our back field where the only traffic is a family of deer in late evening. So I look around and find that my grandchildren have left hula-hoops and kickballs behind the patio gazebo. The MVFF Flybrary No, this is not a typo.

The "Flybrary" is an idea I stumbled upon while reading a flyfishing website this Spring. What it involves is a manner in which members and/or guests can share with each other the flies they use to catch fish. I can't tell you how many times someone has given me a fly and they have no clue the name of the fly, or how it's used, or the actual effectiveness of the fly. By sharing flies using the "Flybrary," all of those hurdles are overcome.



How the Flybrary works is by establishing a box displayed at our monthly meetings with cards in it. A person wishing to share a fly with others, gets a card, fills out some information about the fly, attaches the fly to the card, and returns it to the box. When another person sees a fly they might want to use, they can take the fly and the card out of the box. Now they have a fly that has been effective in catching fish, some information about how to use the fly, and they have the name of a MVFF member they can contact if they have questions about the fly, or the recipe to make it themselves.

DEVELOPMENT OF ADOPT-A-BRIDGE/STREAMWATCH PROGRAM

For years the TU Madmen Chapter has conducted cleanups on the Mad River. In recent years the Ohio Trophy Trout Hunter, the TU Madmen Chapter along with other groups and individuals have conducted 2 major cleanups per year. This year, because of Covid, there hasn't been a cleanup but hopefully later this fall. Cleanup of litter doesn't just make the area more aesthetically pleasant, but is also great for public relations with communities and landowners. Unfortunately, the cleanups are not enough to address the constant littering, especially at bridge areas with access to the Mad. Also, in recent years there are more episodes of open dumping. To address the litter and open dumping issues the TU Madmen Chapter is developing the ADOPT-A-BRIDGE/STREAMWATCH Program. As the



program is developed we will be reaching out to local officials, businesses, agencies, groups, organizations and individuals in Clark, Champaign and Logan counties to get involved and support the program. But, for now we are looking for volunteers to adopt a bridge or area in the Mad River watershed to pick up litter on a more consistent basis and as part of the semi-annual cleanups. Yellowstone Trip 2020

We hollered "Hey Bear" and he looked up and wandered off. We decided it would be best to go up the river away from the direction he headed. The Gibbon was great. Several fish were caught by our group including a grayling and a really nice cutthroat trout. The Madison was low and gin clear. Only a couple fish were seen. The Firehole was great as well with several fish to hand.



Day 6 - We fished the river that runs through camp, the North Fork of the Shoshone. I had an awesome day catching several 16"-17" rainbow trout and countless additional fish. I really enjoyed this river.



WORK ACTIVITIES CONTINUE ON THE MAD

Have you seen the new sign at the State Routes 29 and 296, access area? Recently, ODNR installed the sign at the new access area that identifies the Central Ohio Fly Fishers (COFF), Miami Valley Fly Fishers (MVFF), Buckeye United Fly Fishers (BUFF), along with TU State Council and Madmen Chapter, for assisting in the property acquisition (https://mvff.us/wp-content/uploads/2020/08/Rt_29_and_296_Access_Sign.jpeg). Thanks again to these groups for their donations. From the new access area the state property continues downstream of the St. Rt. 29 bridge. The TU Madmen Chapter has cleared a path on the east side to improve access and looks forward to working with ODNR on additional improvements.



The trail, on state-owned property below the Pimtown Rd. bridge, has recently been cleared, in addition; work has been done to address down trees in the river here and on the Watson property. The trees were cut and moved to open stream flow, create habitat and prevent the formation of log jams and bank erosion. Thanks to our small work crew of Mike Palatas, Dave Dailey, Jeff Lange, Randy Kirchner and Tom Allen. We hope to have bigger work crews for future activities, including in-stream habitat improvement projects, currently being planned with ODNR. Please help keep these areas clean and consider helping with future activities.



Mid-Week Fly Fishing Events (canceled until further notice)

While they are canceled as club-sponsord events we have left the schedule here and on the website. The outings were all being held at area parks and many of those parks remain open. Individual members can still elect to fish.

From Five Rivers MetroParks: Following directives from Ohio Governor Mike DeWine, the Ohio Department of Public Health, Public Health - Dayon and Montgomery County and the CDC to limit public gatherings, all Five Rivers MetroParks events, programs, shelter and camping reservations and rentals are cancelled **through June 7.** Registered program participants, permit holders, and those with facility rentals and reservations will be notified of the cancellations and full refunds will be issued in the coming days. All volunteer activities also are cancelled. Although all indoor spaces have been closed to the public (**including restrooms**), Five Rivers MetroParks' outdoor parks and trails remain open. It is recommended visitors take preventative action when visiting the park system, such as self-monitoring and practicing social distancing.

There are parks that are not part of Five Rivers MetroParks on this list so also watch for any postings that might indicate the park is closed. In all cases take care.
