Our November speaker will be Jonathan Horn who will be presenting "The Wisconsin Driftless: Coldwater stream restoration best explored with flyrod inhand".

The Coon Valley in western Wisconsin was the site of one of the first soil and water conservation projects in the U.S. (1930s). Since that first success, the region's spring

creeks have been gradually restored, resulting in hundreds of little creeks with 1000's of fish per mile! Even better, many farmers invite you to fish their property! The fishing is consistent all summer long without crowds or drift boats to contend with and the terrestrial fishing can be downright incredible! You owe it to yourself to experience it at least once.

Fishing Bio: Jon is an avid outdoorsman and biologist - whose love of fly fishing trumps all other pursuits. By the age of 10 he had read the entire Trout (The Hunting and Fishing Library) and fell in love with the aesthetic of trout streams. With the help of a few other books, he taught himself (and his older brother) how to

2020 Michigan Salmon Trip

How many fishing trips have you been on where the story is that you should have been there the previous week or you were too



early for the best fishing. How about the weather turns bad as soon as you arrive. Then sometimes the fish can't be located or the ones you find have 'lockjaw'. All the above has happened to all of us from time to time.

Well I'm pleased to report none of the above happened to us on the salmon trip to Michigan a few weeks ago. As a matter of fact we had pretty much the perfect trip this year. Our 24 fishermen checked in to Barothy Lodge on Sunday, October 4th and everything fell into place. We also had 6 of our Club Ladies camping in Baldwin as well. The weather was beautiful and got nicer every day we were there. The rain hit the previous week which brought a fresh run of migrating salmon upstream to meet us and more fresh salmon arrived every day.

I have been going up to fish the 'run' on the Pere Marquette River for almost 25 years now and have only seen more fish in the river once or twice, but have never seen more 'big' fish in the river before. The average fish this year was probably over 20 lbs. and there were more fish pushing 30 lbs. than you could count. Good hookups were plentiful and breakoffs and straightened hooks were frequent. Just like the great line in *Jaws* when they see the shark and say "we need a bigger boat", I heard it said more than once this year that "We need a bigger net!" to land some of these fish.

If you have not experienced this fishing, I can only tell you that you are missing a great time fighting and trying to land big fish in a natural river environment on the fly rod. While fishing for the salmon we also caught a good number of brown trout that hit our flies and one or two steelhead that were feeding on the salmon eggs. I would love to tell you how many Kings we landed for the week, but we did not keep track of the numbers. I know we landed well over a hundred salmon for our group.

My estimation is that the most fish were landed by Eric Rice, followed closely by Phil Ritter. I netted fish for both of them that probably topped 30 lbs. You might check out the many great pictures posted on our MVFF Facebook page.

After fishing all day long, the evenings at the lodges were a great time. Our evening dinners were fabulous and the stories and laughs were plentiful. I was with the group of 14 at Long Lodge, but I stopped by to check on the 10 guys at Turkey Lodge a couple of times and have a "cup of coffee" with them after dinner, and I believe they spiked my coffee as I staggered back to Long Lodge to plan for the next day's fishing.

I know it will be a stretch to expect to top the trip next year, but we can always hope. I also know it can't get here soon enough!

Trout Unlimited Guidance

Here's what Trout Unlimited recommends for responsible fishing, given what we know about the threats posed by the coronavirus outbreak and the COVID-19 disease:

- Practice appropriate social distancing. The Centers for Disease Control recommend keeping six feet between you and other people. We'll make it even easier stay a rod's length apart.
- Wear a face covering when you come into contact with other anglers. A Buff or a mask can help keep you safe, and it's a sign of respect for others who are trying to stay healthy during these trying times.
- Avoid fishing from boats if you can it's tough to maintain social distance in a boat. If you must fish from a boat, remember to cover your nose and mouth with a mask or a gaiter.
- Fish local. Stay close to home.
- Drive to the river separately if you're meeting a fishing buddy. Better yet, consider fishing alone (where that's safe, of course).
- If you don't feel well, or are running a temperature, it's best to stay home.

Your contributions to or use of these flies is encouraged. Keep them coming. Ken Norton has

contributed a Foam Ant on a #14 hook, John Young a John's Zonker on a #4, and we are certain that this is what Shawn uses at the summer meetings at the F.O.P., a Bungee-Legged Spider on a #18. (Shawn says inventors of that particular fly were former MVFF members, Anthony & Jeffrey Back. 2021 MVFF Beginner Fly Tying Class

It is now time to sign up for the 2021 Beginner Fly Tying Class. The class is free to members as one of the many benefits of MVFF membership. This is going to be a basic class for those new members and members that would like to learn how to tie flies that missed out on some previous classes.

The class will be on Tuesdays starting January 5, 2021 and will be held weekly for 8 weeks. The class will run from 5:30 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. (Past classes have run 12 weeks, but it was the consensus of those who have assisted in previous classes that 12 weeks was too long and we kept losing people in the classes. So we will try the 8 week version this time.)

Classes will be held at Rona Community Church, 1082 Rona Parkway Dr., Fairborn, OH 45324 as in recent years.

There are several changes that must be made to conduct fly tying classes. We are trying to adapt to the current conditions so we can continue to provide on a limited basis what has been provided in the past years. We currently have fewer volunteers to assist in class due to Covid-19 and health concerns this year and must adjust to accommodate this new reality.

- All members and guests must wear a protective face covering in class.
- If you have a cold, a temperature or feel sick in any way it is recommended that you do not attend class that day.
- We will have hand sanitizer available.
- We will maintain a protective distance as much as possible while helping or assisting individuals that need help.

It is easy to sign up. You may register by telephone or by email (email is preferred) or by signing up at the November or December MVFF meetings. Call me at 937-603-1312 (cell) and leave me a voicemail or email at <u>fcox@woh.rr.com</u> (again, this is the preferred means of contact). Class sign-up information needed is as follows: Name, email, home address, and phone number - *and a request to rent a tool kit if you need one*.

If you need to rent a tool kit for the class, the cost is \$75.00. The rental fee is returned to you at the last session, provided all tools and storage devices are returned in good working order. Please let me know if you plan on renting a tool kit. If you desire to purchase a tool kit, one option for you would be to go to Fisherman's Headquarters on Keowee Street in Dayton or Reel Fly Rod in Bellbrook, where you can receive a discount for being a MVFF member. You may also purchase kits online or from other fly shops.

If possible, we will try to provide some intermediate classes via Facebook Live or some other virtual option.

November Fly of the Month



Instructions by Bill "Woody" Woodward

1. Flatten the barb on the hook and put it in your vise. Tie in the thread behind the hook eye and wrap it back to the middle of the hook shank.

2. Cut a 3" to 4" piece of gold oval tinsel and tie one end in at the middle of the hook shank. Keeping the tinsel on top of the hook shank, wrap over the tinsel back to the beginning of the hook shank. Let the thread hang. Do not trim off the remainder of the tinsel as it will become the rib of the fly.

3. Lightly dub a section of the thread with dubbing, then wrap the dubbed thread forward to slightly behind the hook eye forming a slim body. Let the thread hang.

4. Now wrap the tinsel rib forward over the dubbed body in evenly spaced wraps to the front of the body and tie it off. Remove any excess tinsel. Let the thread hang.

The MVFF Flybrary No, this is not a typo.

The "Flybrary" is an idea I stumbled upon while reading a flyfishing website this Spring. What it involves is a manner in which members and/or guests can share with each other the flies they use to catch fish. I can't tell you how many

times someone has given me a fly and they have no clue the name of the fly, or how it's used, or the actual effectiveness of the fly. By sharing flies using the "Flybrary," all of those hurdles are overcome.

How the Flybrary works is by establishing a box displayed at our monthly meetings with cards in it. A person wishing to share a fly with others, gets a card, fills out some information about the fly, attaches the fly to the card, and returns it to the box. When another person sees a fly they might want to use, they can take the fly and the card out of the box. Now they have a fly that has been effective in catching fish, some information about how to use the fly, and they have the name of a MVFF member they can contact if they have questions about the fly, or the recipe to make it themselves.

March Brown Spider

Recipe

Hook	Dry, size 12-18
Thread	Black, Brown, Red, or Orange 8/0
Rib	Small Oval Gold Tinsel or Small Gold Wire
Abdomen	Hare's Mask Dubbing, Natural or Dark Brown
Wing	Mottled Brown Hen or Partridge Feather

5. Select a suitably sized hackle feather (the barbs should reach back to either the hook bend or the hook point, at your option), strip off the fluff and stroke the barbs back toward the base of the feather. Tie the feather in by the tip at the front of the dubbed body and make 2-3 wraps moving toward the hook eye, then tie off the feather and remove any excess. (It is suggested that you stroke the barbs back toward the hook bend with each wrap to avoid tying down any barbs.)

6. Form a small thread head, whipfinish, and cut the thread. Apply a small drop of head cement at your option. (When forming the thread head, stroke the hackle fibers back toward the hook bend and wrap over their bases slightly to ensure that the fibers bend back over the dubbed body.)
