Trout Unlimited Guidance

Here's what Trout Unlimited recommends for responsible fishing, given what we know about the threats posed by the coronavirus outbreak and the COVID-19 disease:

- Practice appropriate social distancing. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend keeping six feet between you and other people. We'll make it even easier stay a rod's length apart.
- Wear a face covering when you come into contact with other anglers. A Buff or a mask can help keep you safe, and it's a sign of respect for others who are trying to stay healthy during these trying times.
- Avoid fishing from boats if you can it's tough to maintain social distance in a boat. If you must fish from a boat, remember to cover your nose and mouth with a mask or a gaiter.
- Fish local. Stay close to home.
- Drive to the river separately if you're meeting a fishing buddy. Better yet, consider fishing alone (where that's safe, of course).
- If you don't feel well, or are running a temperature, it's best to stay home.

December Fly of the Month



Instructions by Bill "Woody" Woodward

1. Flatten the barb on the hook and put it in your vise. Tie in the thread behind the hook eye and wrap it back to the start of the hook bend, laying down a good thread base.

Tie in a 3"- 4" piece of floss at the hook bend on top of the hook shank with the length of the floss going back over the hook bend.
(This floss will be used to separate the wings.)

3. Cut and stack by the tips a small bunch (say 1/2 the hook gap in thickness) of deer hair. Tie in this hair by the tips at the hook bend. (Be sure to keep the hair on top of the hook shank and the piece of floss that you previously tied in.) Wrap the thread back to the hook bend.

4. Tie in a 10"-12" piece of floss at the hook bend on top of the hair and then wrap the thread forward to about 1/3 of the hook shank behind the hook eye. Now wrap the long piece of floss forward to cover the rear 2/3rd's of the hook shank. Wrap the floss in such a manner as to form a football shaped abdomen, then tie off the floss and remove the excess.

5. Now pull the deer hair forward over the floss abdomen and tie it down tightly. Remove any excess hair. (Be sure to keep the hair on top of the hook to simulate wing covers.) Pull the short piece of floss over the deer hair and tie it off. Remove any excess floss. (Be sure to keep the floss centered on top of the deer hair wing. This is to simulate the joint between the wings.)

Eastern Beetle

Recipe

Hook	Long shank dry, size 8 - 12
Thread	Black 8/0
Abdomen	Black floss
Wing covers	Green deer hair
Thorax	Peacock herl
Thorax cover	Black plastic film
Hackle	Black hen

6. Cut a $3^{\circ} - 4^{\circ}$ piece of plastic film (I like to use Thin Skin), remove the paper backing, and tie it in at the end of abdomen and wing case with the length of it laying back toward the hook bend and the shiny side down. (Be sure when tying it down that you wrap back over the wing case slightly so that there are no gaps.).

7. Select 3-4 strands of peacock herl and tie them in at the base of the abdomen. Twist them together into a loose rope and wrap the rope forward to slightly behind the hook eye, forming a thick thorax. Tie off the herl and remove any excess.

8. Select a hen feather with barbs about the length of the hook gap. Tie in the feather by the tip in front of the herl thorax. Take 2 turns of the feather in front of the thorax, tie it off, and remove any excess feather. Now stroke any feather barbs on top of the hook to the sides.

9. Grasp the plastic film and pull it forward over the thorax and feather barbs and tie it off right behind the hook eye. Remove any excess plastic.

10. Form a neat thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread.

11. Apply head cement to the head, wing covers, and abdomen. Multiple coats of cement may be necessary to adequately cover the wing covers and abdomen to achieve the hard case appearance common with beetles.

The "Flybrary" is an idea I stumbled upon while reading a flyfishing website this Spring. What it involves is a manner in which members and/or guests can share with each other the flies they use to catch fish. I can't tell you how many times someone has given me a fly and they have no clue the name of the fly, or how it's used, or the actual effectiveness of the fly. By sharing flies using the "Flybrary," all of those hurdles are overcome.

How the Flybrary works is by establishing a box displayed at our monthly meetings with cards in it. A person wishing to share a fly with others, gets a card, fills out some information about the fly, attaches the fly to the card, and returns it to the box. When another person sees a fly they might want to use, they can take the fly and the card out of the box. Now they have a fly that has been effective in catching fish, some information about how to use the fly, and they have the name of a MVFF member they can contact if they have questions about the fly, or the recipe to make it themselves.

2021 MVFF Beginner Fly Tying Class

It is now time to sign up for the 2021 Beginner Fly Tying Class. The class is free to members as one of the many benefits of MVFF membership. This is going to be a basic class for those new members and members that would like to learn how to tie flies that missed out on some previous classes.

The class will be on Tuesdays starting January 5, 2021 and will be held weekly for 8 weeks. The class will run from 5:30 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. Classes will be held at Rona Community Church, 1082 Rona Parkway Dr., Fairborn, OH 45324 as in recent years.

There are several changes that must be made to conduct fly tying classes. We are trying to adapt to the current conditions so we can continue to provide on a limited basis what has been provided in the past years. We currently have fewer volunteers to assist in class due to Covid-19 and health concerns this year and must adjust to accommodate this new reality.

- All members and guests must wear a protective face covering in class.
- If you have a cold, a temperature or feel sick in any way it is recommended that you do not attend class that day.
- We will have hand sanitizer available.
- We will maintain a protective distance as much as possible while helping or assisting individuals that need help.

It is easy to sign up. You may register by telephone or by email (email is preferred) or by signing up at the December MVFF meeting. Call me at 937-603-1312 (cell) and leave me a voicemail or email at <u>fcox@woh.rr.com</u> (again, this is the preferred means of contact). With only 8 spaces available you have to act fast. Class sign-up information needed is as follows: Name, email, home address, and phone number - *and a request to rent a tool kit if you need one*.

If you need to rent a tool kit for the class, the cost is \$75.00. The rental fee is returned to you at the last session, provided all tools and storage devices are returned in good working order. Please let me know if you plan on renting a tool kit.

PLEASE NOTE: Based on ongoing conditions, we will keep a close watch on what is happening in Ohio about Covid-19 and whether conducting a class is both feasible and prudent. We will post on our Facebook page about any changes in this planned class and will call the members who have signed up.

Thanks to everyone who completed the questionnaire. We had good participation with 62 members helping provide feedback. The results are in the table shown here. Some highlights: 87.1% of respondents had registered on the site (while about 64% of all adult members are registered) • The majority (61.3%) primarily access the site on their computer, although 29% primarily do so with their smartphone • 46.3% had logged in over the past 30 days • A large proportion of users found the site useful, easy to use and were able to find what they were looking for • 69.4% said they might use the forum if there was more activity There were good comments and questions. Here are a few . . . "How about a place to upload photos like a members photo gallery." As it is now individual

members photo gallery." As it is now individual members can post photos to our Facebook page and even create photo albums. We provide links to the albums on the website and in *Tightlines*. It makes for easier administration as there is no way to have members post photos directly to our website.

"Is there a way to set up an email alert when someone posts something new on the forum? I know you can have it email you when someone responds to your post." While it would be nice to have this feature we do not have the ability to send out such alerts for new items. You can follow a topic however.

"I went out to pay my dues today and it did not automatically fill in the cost. Does not seem very friendly and I usually see the price filled in when I click to pay through PayPal." The PayPal portal interface has been changed to reflect the pricing automatically.
