This month this space is dedicated to two passionate fly fishers whose lives crossed paths nearly fifty years ago. As I was working my way through the small collection of books that Mary Stuart donated from her husband Bill Clutter's library, I came to a two-volume collection simply entitled *Trout*. The author passed away in 2005 after a long life of passion for fly-fishing and writing. What makes this recounting remarkable is the hand written note and signature on the flyleaf of the first volume. You will recognize the author from other books in our library, Ernest Schwiebert. The note was to his great friend and fellow fisher, teacher, and photographer, Gerald (Jerry) Schrader, who died in September 2014.

Here is Ernest's note to Jerry written in 1984.

" For Jerry Schrader, who has seen the magic bright rivers tumbling towards the sea, the choreography of swifts and swallows working to a hatch of fly, and the guicksilver poetry of fish themselves."

The MVFF Flybrary

The "Flybrary" is an idea I stumbled upon while reading a fly fishing website this Spring. What it involves is a manner in which members and/ or guests can share with each other the flies they use to catch fish. I can't tell you how many times someone has given me a fly and they have no



clue the name of the fly, or how it's used, or the actual effectiveness of the fly. By sharing flies using the "Flybrary," all of those hurdles are overcome.

How the Flybrary works is by establishing a box displayed at our monthly meetings with cards in it. A person wishing to share a fly with others, gets a card, fills out some information about the fly, attaches the fly to the card, and returns it to the box. When another person sees a fly they might want to use, they can take the fly and the card out of the box. Now they have a fly that has been effective in catching fish, some information about how to use the fly, and they have the name of a MVFF member they can contact if they have questions about the fly, or the recipe to make it themselves.

You can get cards at the meetings (when they start happening again) or on the website at https://mvff.us/wp-content/ uploads/2020/08/MVFF-Flybrary-Project.pdf. Complete some of these during this down time and bring them to the first in-person meeting, hopefully, not far away.

March Fly of the Month



Instructions by Bill "Woody" Woodward

- 1. Attach the thread behind the hook eye and wrap a tight thread base back to the middle of the hook shank and remove any thread tag.
- 2. Tie in a 3"-4"piece of copper wire by one end (the length of the wire should extend back over the hook bend where you stopped the thread base). Keeping the wire on top of the hook shank, wrap over it with tight thread wraps back to the hook bend. Let the thread hang.
- 3. Cut a 3"- 4" piece of chenille and strip one end to the core. Tie the chenille in by the stripped core at the hook bend and wrap it forward in touching turns toward the hook eye covering the rear 3/4s of the hook shank. Tie it off and remove any excess chenille.
- 4. Wrap the copper wire forward in evenly spaced turns as a rib to the front end of the chenille body and tie it off. Remove any excess wire.

Bluegill Bomber

Recipe

Hook Wet, size 8 - 14 Thread . . . Black 6/0 or 8/0

Body Brown or Olive rayon chenille, medium or

Peacock Krystal Flash Chenille, medium

Rib Copper wire

Wing Pheasant body feather (aka: Church window)

Hackle Hen, brown

- 5. Select a pheasant body feather and remove the fluff. Strip off the fibers from the base so that you are left with a feather tip that is as wide as the fly body. Trim the top of the remaining tip so that it is flat across the top. Tie the feather in by its butt as a wing case **on top** of the hook shank at the front end of the body. (Note: This is similar to the wing case for a Zug Bug.) Trim off any excess feather butt.
- 6. Select a brown hen hackle feather with barbs that will reach from the hook eye back to slightly past the hook bend. Strip off the base fluff and tie it in by its butt at the front of the body. Wrap it forward toward the hook eye for 4-5 turns then tie it off and remove any excess. (Be sure to stroke the fibers back with each wrap.) Wrap the thread back over the fiber butts slightly to ensure that the fibers lay back over the body.
- 7. Form a neat thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread. Apply head cement to the thread head, if desired.

Patrick Berry, President and CEO of Fly Fishers International, added: "FFI is dedicated to partnering with leading conservation organizations such as Trout Unlimited to ensure protection of our fisheries and their associated habitats for the benefit and enjoyment of the broader fly-fishing community. 
Further, like TU, FFI focuses on the importance of a thriving community of individuals who value the camaraderie of angling and appreciate that learning never stops.

Trout Unlimited Guidance

Here's what Trout Unlimited recommends for responsible fishing, given what we know about the threats posed by the coronavirus outbreak and the COVID-19 disease:

- · Practice appropriate social distancing. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend keeping six feet between you and other people. We'll make it even easier - stay a rod's length apart.
- Wear a face covering when you come into contact with other anglers. A Buff or a mask can help keep you safe, and it's a sign of respect for others who are trying to stay healthy during these trying times.
- Avoid fishing from boats if you can it's tough to maintain social distance in a boat. If you must fish from a boat, remember to cover your nose and mouth with a mask or a gaiter.
- Fish local. Stay close to home.
- Drive to the river separately if you're meeting a fishing buddy. Better yet, consider fishing alone (where that's safe, of course).
- If you don't feel well, or are running a temperature, it's best to stay home.
