Notes from the Library June 2021

We would like to start this month's *Notes* by thanking Kelly Kingery for suggesting we add Gordan Van Der Spuy's *The Feather Mechanic* to the MVFF library. Look for this unique perspective to be listed soon on the library roster.

In the upcoming auction two autographed books will be offered for someone's personal library. Jason Borger is no stranger to trout fishermen worldwide. What may not be so widely known is that Jason is an accomplished artist and illustrator. In the *Nature of Fly Casting* he brings both his teaching, writing, and art work to bear on the fundamentals as well as the accomplished casting skills. Signed simply "May a river always run through your life.", this volume will be a worthy addition.

In 1978 Earnest Schwiebert wrote a two-volume treatise simply entitled *Trout*. In 1984 Earnest autographed the new addition and gave it to his long-time friend and fishing buddy Jerry Schrader. Though they lived hundreds of miles apart for much of their lives they made time each year to fish together. Earnest wrote in that inscription "Who has seen the magic of

bright rivers tumbling toward the sea...". You can sense the depth of the friendship as well as the passion for their shared sport. At nearly 900 pages each this is not light reading but a foundational reference for the dedicated trout pursuer.

New Creel Submission Capability Added

A new page, *Creel Submission* (https://mvff.us/species-caught/), has been added to the site in the Member Area menu. We developed a web page for members to easily submit their catch info in a way that would make it easy to gather and tabulate.

So give it a try. Just submit information on your catches for each day of fishing. You will be prompted to make a new entry upon submission which will take you to a new blank form - you would do this if you had multiple species that day (a separate submission is to be made for each species).

By making a creel submission you are giving permission to share information with fellow club members. (Emails will not be shared or published in *Tightlines*.)

We'll see how this goes and in the future may have a little competition to see who caught the widest variety of species over a set period of time, most fish, largest fish, etc.

June Fly of the Month

- 1.Tie in the thread about 1/4 hook shank behind the hook eye and form a thread base for the wings. Let the thread hang 1/4 hook shank behind the eye.
- 2. Select a wood duck feather and remove the fluff. Preen the barbs from the tip back toward the butt to align the barbs tips. Once the barbs tips are aligned, grasp a section and cut them from the stem to create a sizeable bunch (50-60 barbs). You may have to cut several bunches to get enough barbs. Be sure to align the tips, then gather them together into one bundle and take them in your fingertips and roll them softly to further consolidate the bundle. Now place the bundle on top of the hook shank with the tips pointing out over the hook eye and, using a pinch loop, tie them in on top of the hook shank 1/4 of the hook shank behind the hook eye. (The wing should equal the length of the hook shank from the front tip of the eye to the middle of the bend.) Bind down the butt ends back to the middle of the hook shank. Trim the excess butts and return the thread to the wing tie-in point.
- 3. Carefully lift the bundle and make several tight thread wraps against the front edge of the bundle to make it stand upright. Now divide the wing bundle into two equal bunches using a bodkin and then pass the thread between them from front to back, crossing over the hook shank, then bringing the thread around the underside of hook and passing it forward between the wings in a figure-eight pattern. Make a second figure eight wrap. If the wings are not sufficiently divided, make ONE complete turn of thread around the base of the far wing bunch, then pass the thread under the hook shank and make ONE complete turn of thread around the near wing bunch. (Be careful to not apply too much tension as this will flatten the wings.) Now make several turns around the hook shank behind the wings and wrap the thread back to the hook bend.

Gray Fox

Recipe

Hook Dry, size 10-14
Thread Brown or tan 6/0 or 8/0
Wing Lemon wood duck fibers

Tail Dark ginger or brown hackle fibers

Rib Brown thread

Body Pale Red Fox fur or tan, pale yellow, or gray dubbing

Hackle Grizzly and dark ginger or brown

Head Thread

Back Back of the fly can be colored with brown marker

- 4. Take several dark ginger hackle fibers (10-12), align their tips and tie them in on top of the hook shank at the hook bend as a tail. Wrap thread tightly over the butts back to the end of the wing butts forming a slightly tapered body. Trim off the excess hackle fiber butts. (The tail should equal 3/4 of the length of the hook shank.) Wrap the thread back to the hook bend.
- 5. Tie in a 3-4" length of brown 6/0 thread at the hook bend as rib material, then return the thread to over the hook bend. (You can double the thread if it appears to be too thin.)
- 6. Apply small amount of dubbing to the thread, then wrap the dubbed thread forward to slightly behind the wing, forming a tapered body.
- 7. Now wrap the thread rib forward in 5-6 equally spaced turns over the dubbed body and tie it off. Trim off the excess rib.
- 8. Select one appropriately sized grizzly hackle feather and one dark ginger or brown hackle feather and trim the fluff from their bases. Tie-in the hackle feathers at the end of the body with the bright side facing you and the tip pointing back toward the hook bend. Make several turns of thread to secure the hackles, trim the butt ends, then wrap the thread forward to one hook eye length behind the hook eye.
- 9. Grasp the tip of the grizzly hackle feather with hackle pliers and wrap it forward, making 2-3 turns behind the wings and 3-4 turns in front of the wings. Tie off the hackle and trim excess.
- 10. Repeat step 9 with the ginger or brown hackle feather.
- 11. Form a thread head, whip finish, and apply head cement.
- 12. The top of the body can be lightly colored with permanent brown marker, if desired.

I have seen catfish, bluegills, crappies, carp, LMB and SMB. come out of this lake. I have heard of wipers and perch here, and I have seen a photo of a pike that was reported to have been caught here. In September, the shad are usually schooling here, and the bass are actively pursuing them. If you bring your kayak, bring your wheels, because it's a long way from the parking lot to the nearest launch. Be careful when parking! Even one wheel on the grass will get you a \$36 ticket.

The MVFF Flybrary

The "Flybrary" is an idea I stumbled upon while reading a fly fishing website this Spring. What it involves is a manner in which members and/or guests can share with each other the flies they use to catch fish. I can't tell you how many times someone has given me a fly and they have no clue the name of the fly, or how it's used, or the actual effectiveness of the fly. By sharing flies using the "Flybrary," all of those hurdles are overcome.



How the Flybrary works is by establishing a box displayed at our monthly meetings with cards in it. A person wishing to share a fly with others, gets a card, fills out some information about the fly, attaches the fly to the

card, and returns it to the box. When another person sees a fly they might want to use, they can take the fly and the card out of the box. Now they have a fly that has been effective in catching fish, some information about how to use the fly, and they have the name of a MVFF member they can contact if they have questions about the fly, or the recipe to make it themselves.

The 2021 GREAT Smallmouth Bass Fishing Challenge

Register for The 2021 GREAT Smallmouth Bass Fishing Challenge on the Great Miami River. Hosted by the Great Miami Riverway and the National Association of Professional River Anglers (NAPRA), this is a family-friendly, virtual fishing tournament from June 15th – July 15th.

This is a catch and release tournament only. Anglers can fish anywhere on the Great Miami River from Sidney to Hamilton, Ohio. Fishing is a great way to social distance and still get outside.
