A Farewell to Rod Building Classes

I am sorry to announce that the rod building classes have come to an end for me. My age and vision problems have gotten the best of me. I would like to express great thanks for those who have ably assisted me over the past 40 years – Dick Matson, Ray Lee, Joe Nagel, & Joe Hill. These guys made it all happen! As I recall, I used to reward Dick Matson with a standing rib roast at the end of the year.

I guess several hundred MVFF members have participated in the classes starting in 1982. The first class had 13 "students" and I was overwhelmed! Later classes were limited to 5 or 6 new people, but Saturday afternoon & Sunday morning sessions were opened for the overflow and old grads.

For several years (5 or 6) we also offered a series on rebuilding old cane rods – making heavy 9-footers into fishable 7 -7.5' versions with all new hardware. It was popular, but an unreliable supply of old rods put an end to it.

My wife used to complain about students going through the living room to use the bathroom. She would be grading theme papers and hated the interruptions. Everyone thought they had to stop and chat. She even threatened to get a motel room on weekends we held classes!

While I'll miss the camaraderie of our classes, I won't miss the ordering of supplies or the bookkeeping involved. Toward the end, we finally got the presentation and innovations right. It just took a long time!

Over the years, I finally did get to make 800 custom rods. #800 was special and built for myself. Dan & Doug Daufel were some of my earliest students when they were still in high school. They moved to Montana and recently started Montana Brothers Rodworks offering lightweight rods & blanks. They offered me one of their new blanks as thanks for getting them started. It has caught a number of good fish this season, and I am pleased to honor them in this way. The game had come full circle!

While I won't be making any more custom rods, I will continue doing repairs, as they present a unique challenge to me. I also have a goodly stock of rod parts remaining for those interested. My seeing "device" also allows me to continue making flies.

A couple of months ago Tom Arnold included some pictures and a brief description of his fly-tying table. He challenged us to share our tying set up. I have taken up that challenge and am sharing my fly-tying space with you.

I started my fly-tying at the kitchen table. I had a cheap vise and a shoe box half full of tying supplies. Today, my fly-tying habit has exploded into what you see here. I have an antique carpenter's bench that is seven feet long. It is such a dark color that I had a difficult time seeing dark thread when I tied. I solved this by having my wife sew a white canvas backdrop for my bench. The added benefit of this is that once I am done with a few tying sessions I can fold it up, take it outside, and shake out all the fine stuff that accumulates while tying. I started with one thread and tool holder from Cabela's, but soon added two more. You can never have enough space for thread and tools! I have an old set of drawers and a shelf full of plastic bins that are all stuffed full of tying stuff now. How does a person ever get so much stuff? I think the rabbit zonker strips are multiplying! I also put down a sheet of stained plywood over the carpet so that my office chair can roll easily. There is even enough space for me to have two other tiers with me at the tying bench. I have tied nearly 1,500 flies at this bench over the past year. It is something I can do while watching a football game or an old movie. An added bonus is that my wife's quilting studio is in the same area so we can both work on our hobbies separately, but together, while watching the Ohio State game. Life is good!

Learning Curve

There I was. Making casts with my favorite rod, on one of my favorite bodies of water. A quaint, isolated, local pond you wouldn't know it was there, unless you were looking for it. Rings appeared on the water's surface regularly, inspiring me to tie on a Black Fur Ant. Adding a bit of Gink aided in flotation when the fly became saturated or covered with fish slime.

I very much enjoy dry fly fishing for warmwater species of fish. I especially enjoy using what are traditionally thought of as "Trout Flies" to fish for them. This year it seems one of the most effective flies I've used has been the Black Ant. This particular evening, the strategy was effective. I was catching fish and enjoying doing so.

There were a few others at the park. Shrieks and squeals of children's voices could be heard in the distance. Earlier, a man walked his dog on the far side of the pond. Favorable temperatures and an occasional slight breeze helped me stay "in the zone." I probably heard the slamming of a truck's door, but hadn't given it much of a thought.

Moments later, there was a voice coming from my right, and slightly behind me. "Mind if I watch?" asked the observer. "Not at all," I replied. He asked if I was affiliated with a local fly shop. The shop had scheduled an "Intro To Fly Flshing" event and he hoped to become reacquainted with the sport. "I didn't know about the event. I just happened to come here to fish this afternoon," I responded. A bluegill sipped at my fly and after a short fight, it was brought to hand.

The observer watched intently. He asked the usual questions I've often entertained when people happen by during a fishing trip. "Do you come here often?" "What kind of fish are in the pond?" "What type of fly are you using?" "How many fish have you caught?" He looked stunned when I shared the results of my last visit. "There isn't much mystery to fly fishing," I explained. "If you and I are fish and we both see something that looks like food, I'm thinking, 'I

gotta get that bug before you do.' You're thinking, 'You gotta get that bug before I do.' What we both don't know is, there is a human tied to the other end of it."

"Well that seems easy enough," he remarked. "But what about casting [the fly line]?" he inquired. I knew this question was coming. It often does. I stopped fishing, removed my hat and fishing bag, and placed both on the ground with a sapling in the middle. I described how my hat and bag represented the numbers of 10 and 2 on the face of a clock. The tree represented 12 o'clock. I explained how the basic cast is done by moving the fly rod and stopping at the points of 10 and 2. By doing so, you create the momentum which lengthens the fly line. I continued, "When you have enough line out to reach your target, a fish, you lower the rod."

After a few horizontal "casts," I instructed him to change the plane from side to side to over his head. He was impressed at his newfound skill. "Like anything else, you'll improve with practice," I instructed. With my final tidbit of information, I used an analogy between he and NASCAR drivers. "Those NASCAR guys are professionals. You don't compare yourself to them," I reasoned. "But that doesn't mean you don't know how to drive. Obviously, you drove your truck to get here. The 'experts' say you'll catch most of the fish in your life between where you stand and 30 yards away. So you don't need to cast like the guy in 'A River Runs Through It."

I donned my hat and bag, caught a couple more fish and announced my fishing session was over. We walked to our respective vehicles. "I have a fly rod," he disclosed. "I think it's a 5-weight." "That's all you need," I smiled. I sifted through my fly box and handed him 3 of my favorite flies. A Black Ant among them. He thanked me. Hopefully, I'll see him at the pond. School's out.

Notes from the Library December 2021

The name Gary Borger brings to mind great writing and an inspiring speaker, so finding an authored volume in the archives, no matter how old (1980), creates interest. *Naturals, a Guide to Food Organisms of the Trout* is an early work with illustrations by Robert H. Pils describing the aquatic food sources of North American Trout species. Though in monochrome print and drawing, recipes for creating exacting imitations on the workbench are provided.

Dick Stewart and Farrow Allen have created a colored

workbook, *Flies for Bass and Panfish*, with photographs on the right hand and recipes on the left for tying. This signed first edition was part of Ralph Vermillion's library donated to the club before his move near Austin, Texas. A standing invitation exists to any club member wishing to visit Ralph and to fish the hill country. These books will be on display and available with others at the December club meeting. Well worth checking out.

We received a large number of VHS tapes on a wide variety of trout fishing topics; these will be available free for the taking at the December meeting. As all of these tapes are available in newer formats they will not be kept in the library after December.

December Fly of the Month



- 1. Attach the thread slightly behind the hook eye and wrap a tight thread base back to the middle of the hook bend.
- 2. Dub the thread and wrap a tapered body to just over the hook point. Remove the excess dubbing and let the thread hang.
- 3. Cut, clean, and stack a small bunch of elk or deer hair as a wing and tie it in on top of the hook shank over the hook point. The hair tips should project back to slightly past the hook bend. DO NOT LET THE HAIR SPIN AROUND THE HOOK SHANK. Trim the hair butts and make several tight thread wraps over them to secure them, then return the thread to the wing tie-in point.
- 4. Now dub the thread and wrap it forward over the hair butts to the middle of the hook shank. Ensure that you cover the wing thread wraps with dubbing. Remove the excess dubbing and let the thread hang.
- 5. Cut, clean, and stack a second bunch of hair as the second wing and tie it in tight against the front of the dubbing in the same manner as the first wing. The tips of the second wing should reach back to slightly behind the tips of the first wing, Trim the hair butts and bind them down as in step 3. Let the thread hang.
- 6. Again dub the thread and make a few (2-3) wraps over the wing tie-in thread wraps, then remove any excess dubbing and let the thread hang.

Triple Wing Caddis

Instructions by Bill "Woody" Woodward

Recipe

Hook...... Dry, long shank, size 6-12

Thread..... Brown, 6/0 or 8/0

Body...... Olive, Black, Gray, or Tan dubbing

Wing...... Elk hair or fine deer hair Hackle..... Dry, color of your choice

- 7. Select a hackle feather with barbs the length of the hook gap. Remove the fluff from the base of feather and tie it in just in front of the second wing.
- 8. Dub the thread again and wrap it forward to about 1/8" behind the hook eye. Again, ensure that you cover the wing and hackle tie-in thread wraps. Remove any excess dubbing and let the thread hang.
- 9. Palmer the hackle feather forward over the dubbing to 1/8" behind the hook eye and tie it off. Remove any excess hackle.
- 10. Now cut, clean, and stack a third bunch of hair as the third and last wing and tie it in tightly 1/8" behind the hook eye. The tips of the hair should reach back to slightly behind the tips of the second wing. Lift the hair butts and wrap the thread under them behind the hook eye. Do a whip finish or 2-3 half hitches and cut the thread.
- 11. Now take your scissors and, while resting the blade against the hook eye, cut the hair butts at a backward angle forming a traditional small caddis hair head.

NOTE: It is suggested that you apply head cement to each of the wing tie-in points (AFTER REMOVING THE HAIR BUTTS) as you complete them to help secure and anchor them.
