Are We Our Own Worst Enemy?

I'd like to believe it wasn't always like this. Call me a "romantic," I suppose. But for some reason I envisioned a time when those of us who preferred the long rod over conventional hardware, weren't "snobs" about doing so. For some reason it seems lately, I've come in contact with a number of fly fishers who have a very, very, distinct definition of what exactly "fly fishing" is. Needless to say, it troubles me. It also saddens me.

I love the sport. At the risk of sounding selfish, I acquired the affinity shortly after I realized that I was too old to participate in the sport I loved in my youth - playground basketball. I played basketball on the concrete schoolyard courts of West Philadelphia. No uniforms. No refs. No scouts. The only crowds were the guys who were organizing who "had next," that is; who would take on the winner of the two teams currently participating in the challenge. Teams rarely consisted of 5 players. It was usually 3 or 4. Still, those on the court had to dribble, pass, score, play defense, rebound, and if the group on the court was successful to the point of winning the game, you earned the opportunity to stay on the court to play the next game.


But as time went by, the game changed. The knees couldn't take the pounding, muscles I didn't know I had began to pull, tendons grew weaker, and attitudes morphed from mere heated competition to utter disdain when some sore loser - lost.

Fish, on the other hand, provide a different challenge; albeit a safer one as well. Going after them on their terms doesn't involve getting injured, or worse. Fly fishing when I started, seemed to be a novelty to others. I started using a fly rod because I liked the idea of catching fish while using a method that allowed me to catch a lot of them. But then those who fly fished began to question what I was catching. Their opinion seemed to be that I wasn't really fly fishing since I wasn't catching trout. If I didn't have a trout on the line, well, what I was doing was blasphemous. I'll move on from those "little fish" and get into some "real fly fishing" when "I get on a river," "put on some

waders," "get the 'right' rod," "tie on a Wooly Bugger," or "experience seeing ice form in the guides."

For the record, I have caught trout.

My best was a 16 - 3/4" beauty of a



brown trout, caught on a fly I tied myself! But the fact that I prefer to catch bluegill, bass, and crappie, doesn't make me less of a fly fisher. Where I get disheartened is in the quest of introducing the sport to future generations. Does anyone, including a person who is new to the sport, really need to use a \$600.00 rod, a \$300.00 reel, don \$500.00 waders, spend \$150.00 on a fly line? Likewise, does fly fishing have to be for trophy trout?

My point is simply this: if we are serious about growing the sport, in addition to preserving fisheries for future generations, we need to open up our minds. Fly fishing for warmwater fish is fly fishing, period. Catching a hard fighting "gill" is just as exciting now, as it was when we caught the first fish of our lives. And if we're honest, for most of us, that first fish was most likely some sort of panfish. Let's lose the attitude that fishing for trout is somehow a "higher calling" for those who decide to go after them. I'll go a step further to say tenkara is fly fishing. But for now, I'll leave that subject for another day. We needn't draw any more lines of battle.

February Fly of the Month



- 1. Crush the hook barb and position the bead on the hook.
- 2. Make 4-5 wraps of lead wire on the hook shank behind the bead. Trim off excess lead and then push the lead forward tightly into the back of the bead.
- Tie in the thread behind the lead and make several tight wraps of thread behind the lead to hold it in place. Wrap the thread back to the bend in the hook.
- 4. Take a small bunch of hares ear fur with the guard hairs intact and place it in a hair stacker. After the hair tips are evened, tie the hair down as a tail extending approximately 1/8" past the hook bend. Bind down the butt end of the fur along the hook shank then wrap the thread back to the tail.
- 5. On top of this fur tail, take the black goose biots and tie in a split tail with the tips of the biots extending just past the fur tail. Trim the excess biots and wrap the thread back to the tail.
- 6. Dub a tight body tapered from the tail to slightly behind the bead head.

Rabid Prince

Recipe

Hook...... Nymph, size 10 Thread..... Tan/Brown, 6/0 or 8/0

Head...... Gold bead

Weight..... Small or Medium lead wire (optional)

Tail...... Hares Ear guard hairs topped with split Black Goose Biots

Body...... Hares Ear dubbing Wing...... White Goose Biots

Collar...... Tan and Dark Brown Zonker fur

- 7. Now take two white goose biots and tie a split wing on top of the fly at the front end of the body. The wing tips should extend back to the end of the body. Trim the biot butts.
- 8. With the wing tied in, form a dubbing loop. Take a 1" section of tan zonker strip and place the fur in the dubbing loop and trim off the skin. Twist the dubbing loop to form a fur "hackle" and wrap it twice around the hook behind the bead head and tie it off. Trim the excess loop.
- 9. Now form a second dubbing loop using the dark brown fur and take one and a half turns tightly behind the bead head. Tie off the loop and trim the excess.
- 10. At this point, the fur collar will look unruly. Using your fingertips (a little water helps too!) stroke the fur back toward the tail training it into a swept back look around the hook shank. Once you are happy with the appearance of the collar, take a few thread wraps behind the bead head to hold everything in place. Whip finish and trim off the thread.



Find All Fishing Reports

Fishing reports are broken down by region – Lake Erie, central, northeast, northwest, southeast, and southwest – all of which can be found online.
