More AEP land purchased by ODNR

Ohio's Largest Wildlife Area Grows by 6,898 Acres

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife recently announced the purchase of an additional 6,898 acres at Appalachian Hills Wildlife Area in southeast Ohio. The acquisition brings the total acreage of Ohio's largest wildlife area to 54,525 acres of public land for hunting, fishing, trapping, birding, and outdoor recreation.


"The latest addition to Appalachian Hills Wildlife Area adds vibrant lands to an area already well known for fabulous hunting and fishing," Division of Wildlife Chief Kendra Wecker said. "We are proud to expand outdoor recreation opportunities for all Ohioans and protect wildlife habitats. Thank you to Ohio's sportsmen and women who came together to promote and support this purchase."

The Appalachian Hills Wildlife Area was purchased from American Electric Power from 2018 - 2021.

The Mentoring Committee is very energized and dedicated to the success of the Mentoring Program. Our hope and goal is that this will become a successful program and help lead to sustainment of the club and fly fishing in general.

The MVFF Mentoring Committee and mailbox

(<u>mvffmentor@gmail.com</u>) was stood up roughly a year ago in July 2021. Shortly thereafter, the Mentor and Mentee sign-up pages went live on the club website.

Since that time the committee has put together resources for both Mentors and Mentees which can be accessed from the Members Only page in the "Mentoring" section. These resources include the Mentoring Handbook and other items to help both the Mentor and Mentee succeed in their endeavors. In the past year we have had only three people sign up as a Mentee and they were each paired up with a Mentor. Mentor training was put together and the first training class was conducted in April 2022 with four out of 6 Mentors being able to attend.

Anyone wishing to take the Mentor Training should contact Shawn Johnson (or <u>mvffmentor@gmail.com</u>) so the next training date can be organized. Shawn's contact information can be found in the "Contacts" and "Members" pages of the club web site. If anyone has any ideas or would like to help with a Mentoring event, please contact us at <u>mvffmentor@gmail.com</u>. One idea we have been thinking about is an event with several stations with a "rod owner/coach" at each station having fly rods displayed from possibly 1 WT up to 10 or 12 WT. In this event participants would be given an opportunity to cast a rod of a weight they would like to try and see what it is like to cast. This might be a great opportunity for people to try out a particular weight rod before purchasing. If nothing else, it would give people an opportunity to cast a different weight rod that they might not already own. We might set up a timer and after a set time have everyone rotate through the stations. If we had 12 stations and allowed 5 minutes to cast at each station, it would take 1 hour to get through all the stations/ rods.

We encourage everyone to check out the "Mentoring" section of the MVFF Members Only portion of the MVFF website (www.mvff.us) and sign up as either a Mentor or Mentee. Although our primary focus has been on new members, anyone in the club is more than welcome to sign up as a Mentee. Everyone can help Mentor by welcoming new members into the MVFF family and by helping to promote fly fishing.

September Fly of the Month

Polar Shrimp



1. Place the hook in the vise and tie in the thread about 1/4 hook shank behind the hook eye, then wrap a thread base back to the bend of the hook. Wrap the thread forward to behind the hook eye.

2. (Optional) If using lead wire, make 8-10 wraps on the front half of hook shank, leaving enough room behind the hook eye for the wing, legs and thread head. Wrap a thread dam in front of the wire and at the back of the wire, then cover the lead wire with thread, making a smooth transition on both ends. Wrap the thread back to the bend.

3. Select a bundle of hackle fibers about 1 1/2 times the thickness of the hook shank. Even the fiber tips and tie the bundle in as a tail at the hook bend. Keep the tail on top of the hook shank. **The tail should be the length of the hook gap.** Trim off any excess fiber butts.

4. Cut a 4"-5" piece of chenille, strip one end down to the core,

Recipe

	Heavy Salmon type (Mustad 3906 or 36890), size 2-6
Thread	Black 6/0
Weight (optional).	Lead wire, .020 or .025
Tail	Red hackle fibers
Body	FL Orange or Yellow chenille
Legs	Red or Orange hackle fibers
Wing	White Bucktail or calf tail
Head	Thread

and tie it in by the stripped end at the same place you tied in the tail. Wrap the chenille forward up the hook shank in tight touching turns to a point about 1/4" behind the hook eye and tie it off. Remove any excess chenille.

 Select a bundle of hackle fibers about twice the thickness of the hook shank and tie them in **under** the hook shank at the front of the chenille body as legs. These fiber legs should be about 1/2 the hook shank in length. Remove any excess fiber butts.

6. Cut, clean, and stack a small bundle of white bucktail about 1/2 the thickness of the fly body. Tie the bundle in on top of the hook shank using tight thread wraps right against the front of the chenille body. Trim off the butts at an angle behind the hook eye and cover them with thread.

7. Form a neat thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread. Coat the head with head cement or *Hard as Nails* polish.

Creel Submission

Have you tried the *Creel Submission* page (<u>https://mvff.us/species-caught/</u>)? It is in the Member Area menu. We developed this page for members to easily submit their catch info in a way that would make it easy to gather and tabulate the information and report to members periodically.



So give it a try. Just submit information on your catches for each day of fishing. You will be prompted to make a new entry upon submission which will take you to a new blank form - you would do this if you had multiple species that day (a separate submission is to be made for each species).

By making a creel submission you are giving permission to share information with fellow club members. (Email addresses will not be shared or published in *Tightlines*.)

Casting Competition News!

It's the distance casting event next.

Test out your casting skills by taking part in our casting competition. The only thing required to participate in the casting events is for you to show up. You don't even have to own a fly rod. There is no age requirement or limit, no height requirement, and no previous casting experience is needed. Regardless of skill level, everyone is welcome!

Casting Competition Cut-Off Time

Casting competition will only be from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. No casting will be allowed after 7:00 p.m. The cut-off time will help ensure we are not holding up the meeting with scoring, etc., and give us somewhat of a chance to grab some dinner. So come on over and cast early! **NOTE:** If no one is casting, at the discretion of the judges, we might close as early as 6:30 p.m.

September Casting Competition

This month is the Distance Competition: (using the average of several casts with a club 7 weight rod). Five attempts with the 7 weight to cast as far as you can. Tip: While there are no rules about how many false casts you can make, the fewer you make, the better your results will be. And don't rush the cast - give the rod time to load.

Casting Competition Divisions are as follows:

First Flight: Those that have never won a casting event and all new casters.

Seniors: Casters who have previously won a First Flight casting event or former winners of the First Flight casting division.

Masters: Former winners of the Seniors casting division.

Scoring: Judges will make the final ruling on all scores/distances.



At the end of the outdoor season, overall winners of each division will be determined by averaging scores of all events entered. Whoever has the highest score total in their division will be awarded a trophy at the December awards banquet. Even if you don't win an event, you could still be the overall winner of your division (it's happened before!). So come on over and cast.

Remember - although we do keep score and everyone would like to win, the real point of doing this (other than to just have a good time) is to improve our casting abilities.

New Ideas On How To Break A Fly Rod

- Not having someone hold the door open when you walk in/out with an assembled rod.
- Trip and fall forward walking to the stream with the tip hitting the ground in front of you (always carry it backwards).
- Lay your rod on the ground.
- Lift that rod high when landing fish instead of moving it back.
- Reach up and pull the tip down hard to untangle the leader at the tip top.
- Don't seat the pieces together properly.
- Yank like hell on the rod while trying to free the fly from a tree branch or lily pad.
- Make sure that line is wrapped around the tip top when you set the fly on a large fish.
- Rest your rod on the top of the car when you return from the stream and then drive off forgetting it.
- Put a lot of split shot on the leader then pull back hard on the line making sure to bounce the shot off the rod.
- Rest the rod in the back seat with just the tip out the window and then hit the power button to close it.
- Place the rod against an electric car mirror that closes automatically when you lock the doors.
- Never put the rod away in it's tube when driving home from the stream or lake.
- Loan your favorite rod to your teenager.
- Make sure you grab the rod with your second hand up above the cork when fighting a fish.
- Choose a tippet way too heavy for the rod.
- Get in and out of boats with your rod in hand.
- Hold it high in the house with the ceiling fan running.
- Hold that rod high when the fish runs under the boat.
- Leave your rod out where your dog can exercise his teeth on the cork grip.
