Hello everyone. Welcome to my August 2023 report.

volunteer shirt program and the Little Miami Watershed Network MVFF booth on June 10th. Your hard work towards the club is greatly appreciated.

Another appreciation goes to Todd and Dianne Alexander for providing food for the month of June. I got good reports on the food for that month. So thank you for your time and effort.

I am still recovering from knee surgery on June 20th. Surgery went well and my therapy was in home 3 times a week. Therapy has ended so I am a free man. Doing very well.

Since having surgery and not being able to get out, I would like to reflect on the Canada trip. I started getting ready by looking on YouTube for ideas on tying flies. I found a video by Charlie Craven on tying a Lefty's Deceiver. It looked pretty cool and I had all the material needed to tie it. Game on!! I tied some on 34007-SS hooks in a size 1 and 2, then I down-sized them using a Gamakatsu SC15 size 2 and 4 to catch white bass in Caesar Creek which really helped build my confidence that they would catch fish. The first day in Canada I caught a 28 inch northern pike and a 16 ½ inch smallmouth bass using Lefty's Deceiver. After that I used one all the time in Canada. But the hunt continued for a fish that would get me a free shirt.

Fishing was average on Monday and Tuesday with smoke from the wildfires trying to block out the sun and bringing in hordes of hungry mosquitoes. Yikes!! Wednesday was very windy, so we spent most of that day looking for sheltered areas to fish. On that day it was also shore lunch day with

fried fish, potatoes, beans, salad, and cold drinks. It was all delicious. Thursday morning smoke covered all the lakes making it hard to navigate. Plus, breathing in the smoke was a problem. Later that afternoon, the smoke lifted so Denny Davy and I went out fishing and found a beaver mound and we caught several fish. I hooked a northern pike which came out of the water and flipped my fly out of its mouth. Denny called it a pro-release. I called it frustration.

I still felt like I was not catching enough fish, so on Thursday I signed up for a trip to Horseshoe Lake on Friday.

That night at dinner, Eric Rice told me the office had overbooked that trip and I could go with him to McCarthy Lake instead.

Friday morning Nathan, Karen, Eric and I plus the driver set out for the one-hour drive to McCarthy Lake. We stopped along the way to give two local dogs their dog treats. Evidently, this is what the locals do. We saw 4 bears, 2 cubs, and a sow. Then we saw an older bear that ran right in front of the ATV before ducking into the woods.

Eric and I took a boat and went to one side of the lake while Nathan and Karen took the other side. Eric caught a couple of northern pike and I caught one. As we came to the other end of the lake a beaver swam up to our boat and put its front feet on the boat but did a quick turn around. Thankfully. We then switched boats and headed down the lake. Eric soon caught a 19 inch smallmouth and I caught a northern pike. We caught several more fish including an 18 inch bass. I was still looking for a free shirt.

The best moment of our outing that day was watching 2 northern pike follow Eric's streamer to our boat. While one fish turned away the other one stopped about 5 feet away, Eric cast his streamer close to that fish and it followed the streamer just to the edge of the boat. Eric moved his fly just a little bit and the pike just crushed it. Wow!! I netted the fish and it measured 32 inches. I still have that pictured in my mind. It had to be one of the best moments of the whole trip.

Waterfalls Lodge is a great place to go. Great scenery, great food, comfortable accommodations, and a very friendly staff. Put it on your bucket list.

Up Nor'east

The rain stopped, waking me. We had driven from Binghamton, NY the day before in an increasing downpour. It is hard to say when we crossed into the wilds of southern Vermont, no signs could be read. Our screened bedroom window opened below the deck off the kitchen that was built into the hillside; the winter's wood pile two yards further out. It may have been the rain stopping or the now curious roar of the rising Battenkill just a hundred feet from the door that caused an undercurrent of dread. The rising river had its own tone of rushing destruction. Six inches of rainfall in twelve hours between the Taconic and Green Mountain ranges channeled through narrow rivers that could not contain the flow spread into small fields of truck crops and lowing cattle. I sat upright in the early dark aware



that trout fishing was off the calendar, yet from across the reach between us came sounds of a young girl dreaming of the day ahead and I was happy.

The day began with navy gray clouds and light rain. Up the nine-mile ride on route 7A from Arlington to Manchester she talked out of nervousness and anticipation. She had a broad-brimmed hat, rain slicker, fingerless gloves, and a pink in her cheeks. Truel met us at the door and introduced Forrest. Nine women would make up the first day's class at the Orvis Fly Fishing school. A quick peck on the cheek and I was dismissed!

Manchester hosts our country's history like a warm mackinaw. Battles that helped to win America's independence from Britain were fought and won nearby, Robert Frost's farm is close, Norman Rockwell drew his iconic Saturday Post covers near, Todd Lincoln (the oldest and only sibling to survive his parents, Abe and Mary) built his home and career here as a lawyer and diplomat, and Charles F. Orvis tied his first commercial flies here, building a world class fishing supply company. The American Museum of Fly Fishing is on a bordering property with a wealth of history and respect for those who fostered and fed the growth of fly fishing in America.

Marty and Valery Oakland welcomed us to their ancestral home (The Quill Gordon) on the stretches of the Battenkill River west



of Arlington. In 2011 hurricane Irene charged up the American east coast causing billions of dollars in property damage, but perhaps least noted was the alteration to freestone trout streams such as the Battenkill, Marty shared with me as we sat in front of the windows on the second floor facing the rising river whose flow had increased from 417cfm to over 1,400 in just hours. After, Irene Marty's son had canoed around the flag pole in the front yard! The greatest changes come after such deluges altering the bottoms ... pools that had held fish were filled in, riffles had become smooth planes, large boulders had been washed out of tributaries threatening the bridge supports, and the brownies and rainbows took weeks to find new anchorage. But for Marty's lifelong love of the Battenkill and fly fishing his greatest heartbreak has been the inundation of "floaters" ... those individuals who whether tubing or kayaking had brought with them a sense of entitlement, trashing the river and

having no respect for fishermen on the waters. How to find common usage and respect has become Marty's late-life endeavor. (We learned later one kayaker had attempted to access the engorged river above a bridge that had waters up against the rails.)

Soaking wet, cold to the bone, my sweetheart was waiting on the school porch. Six hours they had stood in the rain ... casting. But she was radiant. Dry clothes, new rain pants and boots, and a meal to remember at Mulligans (finished off with wild blueberry pie and homemade vanilla ice cream) and all was right in this rain soaked, green world. Day two was to apex with the catch of her first rainbow trout ... unaided ... in a spring-fed pond ... but still what a success!

The Unabashed Angler's Dictionary

I am beginning a serial work that I hope will become known as The Unabashed Angler's Dictionary. I have only just begun assembling entries for this tome. Below are some of the definitions I have put together so far.

Α

Angler – (noun) gender neutral, age indiscriminate, a person who attempts to draw fish from a body of water, by any number of means, may be a pragmatist, but is usually overtly optimistic, with an overriding belief that the next technique, lure, bait, or location will yield the fish of a lifetime (SEE: Last Cast)

Acquaintance – (noun) someone you sometimes fish with, but not worthy of the title of Buddy.

В

Buddy – (noun) Also indiscriminate as regards age or gender, a person of nearly infinite compatibility to the angler, agreeable to a fault, and capable of conjuring up necessary items, or ideas, when they are most sorely needed. Buddies come in varying grades, usually determined by factors such as their willingness and ability to accompany the angler on trips of indeterminate duration, or degree of difficulty at any time of day or night, often with little or no warning. Bonus points are awarded for access to necessary items such as boats, extra lures, access to private waters, and such knowledge as may be required to make any trip a success. Persons not possessing the social, knowledge-based or physical properties required to qualify as a buddy are usually classified as an Acquaintance.

C

Cast – (noun) the process of propelling a bait, lure, fly or net into the water for the purpose of catching fish. The means of casting is

contingent on the type of gear the angler is using, the type of fish being pursued, the skill of the angler, and the weather. Fly casting in particular has variants including the stately overhand cast, the chuck and duck, which results in the angler looking more like a Cro-Magnon man trying to avoid a mad hornet, or the spey cast, which is equal parts skill and alchemy. Each cast has a character of its own, imbuing it with the possibility of becoming the cast that caught the fish that will be lionized in tales, told, and retold, over the remainder of the angler's life. The cast most fraught with possibility is the Last Cast. (SEE: Last Cast)

Catch – (noun) a variable term, dependent on numerous factors, up to and including whether one is fishing with a buddy or an acquaintance. The most universal definition is a fish brought to hand, in the grasp and control of the angler. Acquaintances usually insist on strict adherence to the grasp and control portion of the definition of catch. Buddies take a more liberal interpretation. Most buddies include any fish the angler touches as a catch. Some may include fish hooked and lost at boatside, as a pro-release, especially in the case of small fish that neither angler considers worth much bother. On certain days, the radius of the pro-release seems to expand as time goes by, although even buddies have been known to launch a sideways glance or caustic remark in the direction of an angler who claims a pro-release on a nice fish that was still twenty feet away.

Casting Competition

Test out your casting skills by taking part in our casting competition. The only thing required to participate in the casting events is for you to show up. You don't even have to own a fly rod. There is no age requirement or limit, no height requirement, and no previous casting experience is needed. Regardless of skill level, EVERYONE IS WELCOME!

Casting Competition Cut-Off Time

Casting competition will only be from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. No casting will be allowed after 7:00 p.m. The cut-off time will help ensure we are not holding up the meeting with scoring, etc., and give us somewhat of a chance to grab some dinner. So come on over and cast early! **Note:** If no one is casting, at the discretion of the judges, we might close as early as 6:30 p.m.

Casting Competition – August is the Bass Bug

The next competition will be the bass bug. Starting with the bug in hand, the caster is allowed unlimited casts to target 1, and two false casts between targets after that.

Casting Competition Divisions are as follows:

First Flight: Those that have never won a casting event and all new casters.

Seniors: Casters who have previously won a First Flight casting event or former winners of the First Flight casting division.

Masters: Former winners of the Seniors casting division.



Competition Guidelines:

Everyone will cast to the same five rings, using the club rod.

One person from each division will be determined the winner of that night's competition. Based on your cumulative scores of all the events, an overall winner will be determined for each division and presented a traveling trophy in December.

Scoring: (Judges will make the final ruling on all scores; there will be no ties for any event.)

All casters will start with 100 points.

- (-0) Those skillful enough to place the fly inside the gold ring will not lose any points.
- (-1) Any fly that lands inside the black ring will result in the deduction of 1 point.
- (-2) If the fly lands outside all the rings, 2 points will be deducted.

The person in each division with the highest score will win the event for their division.

At the end of the outdoor season, overall winners of each division will be determined by averaging scores of all events entered. Whoever has the highest score total in their division will be awarded a trophy at the December awards banquet. Even if you don't win an event, you could still be the overall winner of your division (it's happened before!). So come on over and cast.

Remember - although we do keep score and everyone would like to win, the real point of doing this (other than to just have a good time) is to improve our casting abilities.

August Fly of the Month



- 1. Place the hook in the vise and start the thread in the middle of the hook shank. Wrap a tight thread base back to slightly past the hook bend. Remove any thread tag.
- 2. Dub the thread with a small amount of red fluorescent dubbing and wrap a small ball of dubbing just behind the hook bend to simulate an egg sac. Remove any excess dubbing and let the thread hang.
- 3. Now dub the thread with yellow dubbing and wrap a slightly tapered body from the front of egg sac to just past the middle of the hook shank. Remove any excess dubbing and let the thread hang. Make sure that the dubbed body is tight against the front of the egg sac with no spaces.
- 4. Select two CDC feathers, place them back to back curved side down, and even the tips. Tie them in on top of the hook shank at the front of the dubbed body. Allow the feathers to come down the sides of the body very slightly. The feather wing

Little Yellow Stonefly

Recipe

Hook Curved nymph, long shank, size 12-16
Thread Light cahill, tan, or pale yellow, 3/0
Egg Sac ... Red or pink fluorescent dubbing
Body Superfine dubbing, sulphur yellow
Wing Pair of sulphur CDC feathers

Hackle Grizzly dyed yellow saddle hackle (Light Ginger is

an acceptable substitute)

Head Thread

tips should reach back to slightly past the bend of the hook shank. Remove any excess feather butts. Let the thread hang.

- 5. Select an appropriately sized saddle hackle and tie it in on top of the hook shank tight against the front of wings with the concave side down. Let the thread hang.
- 6. Now dub the thread with the yellow dubbing and form a thorax by wrapping it forward to slightly behind the hook eye in a reverse taper that is smallest just behind the hook eye. Be sure to cover all the thread wraps for the wings and hackle. Let the thread hang behind the hook eye.
- 7. Wrap (palmer) the hackle forward in 3-4 wraps to right behind the hook eye and tie it off. Remove any excess hackle.
- 8. Form a small thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread. Apply head cement to the thread wraps if desired.

Mad River Drift
