Hotel and to enjoy some great old-world charm away from the main street. You can get away from the crowds in the UP on Rt 123 which takes you to Tahquamenon Falls. The falls are 200 ft. long and drops 50 ft. They are the largest in Michigan. The water has a distinct color of brown which comes from the cedar swamps that feed the river and the falls are mentioned in Longfellow's poem (The Song of Hiawatha). The area was first known for the logging of White Pine, much of the lumber was sent to New York and Chicago after the great fire to help rebuild the city.

The last spot was Pictured Rocks of the shores of Lake Superior near Munising, Michigan. The park was established in 1966. We were amazed by the 200 ft. sandstone cliffs and the clear blue-

green water. There is a beach there that would match any Florida beach. The sand was so soft. Mining was an important resource here with deposits of copper and iron. As these resources ran out the logging of White Pine took over. You can still see large stands of White Pines as you drive up the UP.

Well, I hope that you can see that while I enjoy fishing very much as all of you do, it's important that you spend time with family also.

New MVFF Storage Location

After a few months of discussion the MVFF Board has decided to move to a new storage unit in Xenia. The new unit is 10 ft. x 15 ft., double the size of the old unit and is an inside unit which will protect MVFF's valuable items from mildew and extreme temperature changes. It also offers safety to those who have access to the unit, which was another concern.

The Unabashed Angler's Dictionary (Part 2)

C (continued)

Chuck – predecessor and conjugant of Duck, The act of heaving weighty fly rigs into swollen rivers, hoping to achieve a suitable depth to interest steelhead, salmon, or shad.

Coffee – an essential ingredient for the health and mental well-being of the angler. It is also a pivotal factor in the evaluation of other anglers as buddy material. Personability determinations should be divided into the categories of B.C. (before coffee) or A.C. (after coffee). On a more personal level, one should take care to limit BC communications with other anglers, lest they become permanent residents of the Acquaintance category, rather than being considered as a Buddy.

D

D-loop – initial step in the performance of the Roll Cast. Accomplished by leaning the rod tip slightly to the outside, while lifting the rod to a point where a shallow curve of fly line hangs just behind the angler's shoulder. From that position, the fly line is able to load (or bend) the rod to store energy which will be released as a forward impetus as the angler brings the rod forward, finishing with a pronounced snap of the wrist, ending in the standard delivery position at the end of any cast.

Delivery Point – the end of a cast, achieved with a definite stop, with the fly line a bit above the water. The stop allows the line to straighten fully, prior to falling softly to the water.

Duck – (verb or noun), the postscript to Chuck, an acrobatic half squat designed to remove the angler from the path of weights, and/or hooks being hurled toward a stream by a Chuck. It is strictly an act of self-preservation. By-products of a day of chucking and ducking include a semi-permanent hunker, hyperactivity of the peripheral vision on the side of the dominant casting arm. By-products of incorrectly executed ducks include various lumps, bumps, bruises, cuts, and punctures. A solid puncture

from a large salmon hook near the angler's scapula has been known to cause enough swelling and discomfort to have the angler considering the chances of finding subsequent employment as a lab assistant in Transylvania, or as a bell ringer at a European cathedral.

Е

Emerger – a nascent form of an aquatic insect, as it transitions from its pupal state to a mature form. Also, a stage experienced by anglers during their BC phase, especially when camping. WARNING: Exercise extreme caution; maximize time, distance and shielding when faced with this type of emerger.

F

Ferrule – tubular connection between sections of a fly rod, reportedly the source of expansion of the angler's vocabulary, especially when the angler attempts to break down the rod at the end of a lengthy session on the water.

Floatant – a water repellant mixture that, when applied to a dry fly, may cause it to float on the surface for a duration long enough to attract rising fish. The likelihood of the duration of the float being sufficient to attract a fish is inversely proportional to the size of the fish being pursued.

Fly – a hook dressed with various materials to resemble an item fish find appetizing. They were originally called flies since flying insects were the first types of fish food that fly tyers attempted to emulate. Now, imitations of baitfish sixteen inches long are referred to as flies. Certainly, flies are now divided into numerous categories such as dry flies, nymphs, emergers, streamers, foam bugs, and poppers. Choosing the best fly pattern is an art that is equal parts entomology, and sorcery. Favorite patterns are sometimes shared freely, while others are guarded with a zeal that brings to mind the opening sequence of a 1960's Buck Henry TV comedy about spies.

Casting Competition

It's the distance casting event next.

Test out your casting skills by taking part in our casting competition. The only thing required to participate in the casting events is for you to show up. You don't even have to own a fly rod. There is no age requirement or limit, no height requirement, and no previous casting experience is needed. Regardless of skill level, EVERYONE IS WELCOME!

Casting Competition Cut-Off Time

Casting competition will only be from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. No casting will be allowed after 7:00 p.m. The cut-off time will help ensure we are not holding up the meeting with scoring, etc., and give us somewhat of a chance to grab some dinner. So come on over and cast early! **Note:** If no one is casting, at the discretion of the judges, we might close as early as 6:30 p.m.

September Casting Competition – the Distance Cast

This month is the Distance Competition: (using the average of several casts with a club 7 weight rod). Five attempts with the 7 weight to cast as far as you can. Tip: While there are no rules about how many false casts you can make, the fewer you make, the better your results will be. And don't rush the cast - give the rod time to load.

Casting Competition Divisions are as follows:

First Flight: Those that have never won a casting event and all new casters.

Seniors: Casters who have previously won a First Flight casting event or former winners of the First Flight casting division.

Masters: Former winners of the Seniors casting division.



Competition Guidelines:

Everyone will cast to the same five rings, using the club rod.

One person from each division will be determined the winner of that night's competition. Based on your cumulative scores of all the events, an overall winner will be determined for each division and presented a traveling trophy in December.

Scoring: (Judges will make the final ruling on all scores; there will be no ties for any event.)

All casters will start with 100 points.

- (-0) Those skillful enough to place the fly inside the gold ring will not lose any points.
- (-1) Any fly that lands inside the black ring will result in the deduction of 1 point.
- (-2) If the fly lands outside all the rings, 2 points will be deducted.

The person in each division with the highest score will win the event for their division.

At the end of the outdoor season, overall winners of each division will be determined by averaging scores of all events entered. Whoever has the highest score total in their division will be awarded a trophy at the December awards banquet. Even if you don't win an event, you could still be the overall winner of your division (it's happened before!). So come on over and cast.

Remember - although we do keep score and everyone would like to win, the real point of doing this (other than to just have a good time) is to improve our casting abilities.

September Fly of the Month



- 1. Attach the thread slightly behind the hook eye and wrap a tight thread base back to the middle of the hook shank, then reverse direction and wrap the thread half-way back toward the hook eye. This should put the thread approximately 1/4 of the hook shank back from the hook eye.
- 2. Cut, clean, and stack a small bunch of deer hair as a wing. Measure the wing to be the length of the hook shank and tie it in on top of the hook shank at the 1/4 point with the tips projecting out over the hook eye. DO NOT LET THE HAIR SPIN AROUND THE HOOK SHANK. Trim the hair butts at an angle and make several tight thread wraps over them to secure them, then cover the remaining hair butts with thread. Return the thread to the front of wing. Lift the hair wing and make several thread wraps tight against the front of the wing to stand up the hair.
- 3. Now wrap the thread back to the rear of the hair butts and tie in a 3"-4" piece of ribbing material with the length of it going back over the hook bend. Wrap the thread over the ribbing material back to almost halfway down the hook bend. Let the thread hang.

Recipe

Hook Curved Caddis, 2x wide, size 10-16

Thread Olive, 6/0 or 8/0

Wing Deer hair, natural or color of choice

Rib Pearl tinsel or small colored wire of your choice Body SLF dubbing, olive or color of your choice

Head SLF dubbing to match body

- 4. Dub the thread and wrap a dubbed body back to just behind the wing. Remove any excess dubbing. (Don't be concerned if the body looks a little scruffy.)
- 5. Palmer the rib forward over the body in four or five wraps and tie it off behind the wing. Remove any excess ribbing and let the thread hang.
- 6. Dub the thread again and make 1-2 wraps behind the wing to cover the rib. Tie off the thread wraps, then divide the hair wing into 2 equal halves with one half going forward over the hook eye and the 2nd half leaning back toward the hook bend. Wrap the dubbed thread between the two wing halves to keep them divided then lift the front wing half and form a dubbed head. Remove any excess dubbing. (You should now have two comparadun style wings with dubbing between them--see the picture.)
- 7. Now make a small thread head behind the hook eye, whip finish and cut the thread. Apply head cement if desired.
