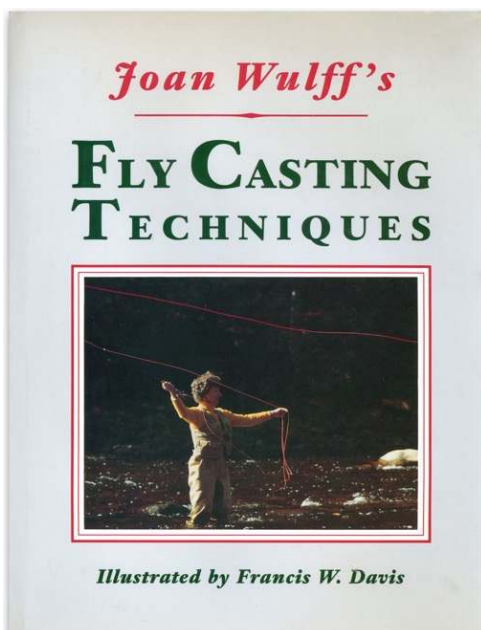
Sharpening Your Casting Skills

Exercises you can do at home to help you meet onstream casting challenges

Joan Salvato Wulff is “The First Lady of Fly Fishing”. Her story and career have inspired countless women to pursue the sport. Wulff revised her first book as Joan Wulff’s New Fly-Casting Techniques republished many times.

In 1979 she and her husband, Lee Wulff, founded the Joan and Lee Wulff Fishing School (today is known as the Wulff School of Fly Fishing) in Lew Beach, New York. Through the casting techniques taught at the school, the couple designed (and Garcia produced) the Fly-O, the first indoor casting practice tool ever made.

By 1980, she had a monthly casting column in Outdoor Life magazine, and the following year she began a regular casting column in Rod & Reel [eventually called Fly Rod & Reel, which died of natural causes of having too good writing] titled “Joan Salvato Wulff’s Fly-Casting.”

In 1985, Wulff wrote a book that would be the first to analyze casting mechanics; Joan Wulff’s Fly Casting Techniques published by The Lyons Press in 1987. Since then, she has published Joan Wulff’s Fly Fishing: Expert Advice from a Woman’s Perspective (1991) and Joan Wulff’s Fly-Casting Accuracy (1997) and released an instructional DVD, Joan Wulff’s Dynamics of Fly Casting (1997), and more.

The Unreasonable Virtue of Fly Fishing

It seems that women in fly fishing are portrayed as a rather new phenomenon, but as the picture and writing show, women have been involved and doing quite well in the sport for a couple of hundred years!

Some excerpts . . .

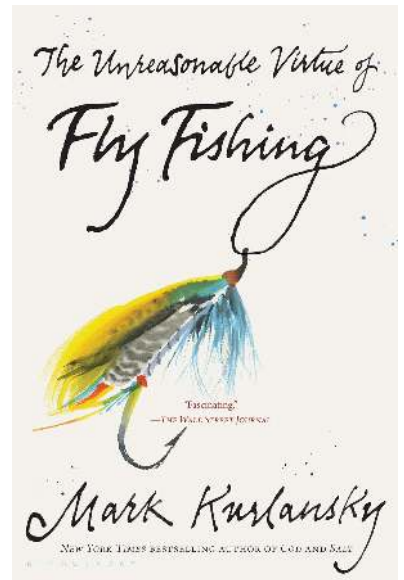
The first bona fide fishing club for women, "the Woman Fly Fishers Club," was founded in New York in 1932.

One of the great British fly fishing legends is Georgina Ballantine. On October 7, 1922, she was fishing the River Tay in Scotland on a boat handled by her father, who was the fishing official on the Glendelvine Estate through which the river runs.

She was having a respectable day catching good-size salmon of twenty-five, twenty-one, and seventeen pounds. She was fishing two rods—one with a Wilkinson fly, a salmon fly with a long feathery tail, and the other with bait. A salmon grabbed the bait and she fought it for most of an hour, trying to get to the bank. The fish was so large and so strong that even when she finally got it to the bank, she could barely lift it. According to one account, she sat on it. It weighed sixty-four pounds and was four feet six inches long. That is the standing record for the largest rod-caught salmon in Britain.

But since Ballantine caught the salmon with bait, the record for catching the largest salmon with a fly was still open to challenge, and two years later, another woman, Clementina Morison, established that record. Popularly known as "Tiny" Morison, she caught a sixty-one-pound salmon on the Deveron in the Highlands with a fly known as the "Brown Wing Killer."

FOR DECADES, MARY Orvis Marbury, born in 1850, was the world's leading fly expert. Even today there are few people with the depth of knowledge she had. The daughter of Charles Orvis, she grew up during the years when her father was just starting to establish his famous fly fishing shop in Manchester, Vermont.



Yellow Stonefly: A Novel

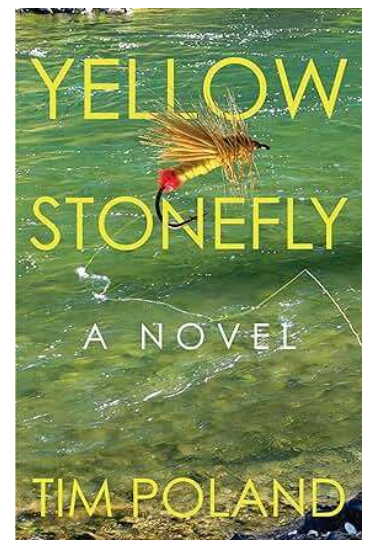
Ohio University Press in Athens is pleased to announce a new paperback edition of a fly fishing novel of suspense set on a stream in southwest Virginia.

The Unabashed Angler's Dictionary (Part 9)

W

Wading – proceeding on foot into the water. Wading can be pursued wearing special, waterproof, boots called waders. This is the cause of some confusion since the anglers wearing the waders are also known as waders. Waders wearing waders as they quickly dodge the 'gators'? Wading is very popular among fly anglers due to the need for backcast room.

Wet Fly – a fly designed to be fished below the surface. Wet flies basically come in two types, insect imitations and attractors. As one might suspect, the insect varieties of wet flies imitate the immature stages of aquatic insects such as mayflies, caddis, or stoneflies. Attractors do just what the name suggests. They don't resemble any insect. They simply stand out from the crowd and attract fish by their gaudy appearance. Higga's SOS, for example, does not imitate any specific insect, but it displays a very buggy appearance that fish seem to find very attractive. Royal Coachman wet flies also do not look like any known insect, yet they definitely draw the interest of many different types of fish.

White Bass – *Morone Chrysops* is a genus/species that more closely resembles a tribe or a wolf pack. These aggressive little mobsters travel in large schools, the better to corral and attack schools of baitfish. Considering this behavior, the best way to catch white bass is to use small streamers. Shad patterns are often best for whites.

Wind – The noun, not the verb. Wind gets very bad press among fly anglers. It is accused of causing errant casts, closemouthed fish, and the dreaded wind knot. Granted, there is ample evidence that certain errant casts come about due to wind. There are times when there is scarcely any way to accurately adjust one's cast to offset for heavy winds. It becomes three times as difficult if the wind is sporadic, or changes direction often. The same offset that resulted in one cast landing precisely where you want it may result in the following cast landing squarely on the adjacent shoreline because the wind suddenly died.

X – There is really only one X associated with fly fishing. Tippet diameters are referred to by a number followed by an X, such as 0X, 1X, 2x on up to 8X. A basic rule of thumb to use in determining which size tippet to use is to consider which size hook you will be throwing and divide by 3. A size 24 hook should be on an 8X tippet, while a size 6 should be thrown on a 2X. This will work fairly well on smaller flies. However, one must remember that the higher the X number, the weaker the line. 8X tests out at just over 1- pound test, which is not going to stop a rampaging 6-pound carp, no matter how well the carp might react to a tiny nymph. On the other hand, a leader that terminates in 35-pound test may not scare away a hungry striper, but a trout in clear water will not come anywhere near a fly tied to anything nearly that thick.

April Fly of the Month

Pine Squirrel Streamer

Recipe

Hook	Streamer, 4-6xl, size 8 to 4
Thread	Brown or color to match body, 6/0
Under body/tail support	Foam rubber strip, 2mm
Tail	Pine squirrel zonker
Body	Pine squirrel zonker
Head	Thread

1. Attach the thread slightly behind the hook eye and wrap a tight thread base back down the hook shank to the hook bend, then wrap it back up the hook shank to about 1/8" behind the hook eye. Let the thread hang.
2. Cut a strip of foam approximately 1/4" wide and tie it in by one end on top of the hook shank slightly behind the hook eye with the length of the strip extending back toward the hook bend. Keeping the foam strip on top of the hook shank, wrap thread tightly over it back to the hook bend. Be sure to bind and compress the foam tightly to the hook shank so it is okay to wrap the thread back and forth over the foam to fully compress it and achieve a level underbody. Now grasp the remaining strip (which should be laying flat on top of the hook shank over the hook bend) and trim it even with the back of the hook bend to create a small flat platform at the hook bend.
3. Take a full strip of squirrel zonker and separate the fur down to the skin approximately 1" from the end of the strip. (Be sure that the fur of the strip is flowing back toward the hook bend.) Lay the strip on top of the hook shank and tie it in tightly at the hook bend where you divided the fur to create a tail. (The fur of the tail should be flowing back over the hook bend.) Now lift the longer length of the strip, wrap the thread in front of it, then wrap the thread forward to behind the hook eye. (At this point, take a very small drop of super glue and

apply it to the top of the little foam platform, then press the bare skin side of the tail down onto it. Be careful not to get any glue on the fur. This step will stabilize the tail and keep it from twisting into the hook bend.)

4. Lift the front section of the zonker strip out of the way and place a light coating of super glue on the foam underbody all the way to behind the hook eye. Now wrap the length of the zonker strip forward in touching turns to behind the hook eye and tie it off tightly.

Trim off any excess strip. (When you wrap the strip forward, be sure that the skin side of the strip is in contact with the underbody/hook shank. Also be sure to stroke the fur backward with each wrap so that it does not come in contact with the glue.)

5. Form a neat thread head being sure to cover any visible skin at the tie-off point. Do a whip finish and cut the thread.

Note: This fly has a lot of movement and will work all day but is especially effective in the evening. Try casting it down and across with a few short strips.
