Coffee, Casting, & Catching

On Saturday, April 6, 2024, the inaugural Coffee, Casting, & Catching event was held. The outing was sponsored by the Miami Valley Fly Fishers Mentoring Committee. Thirteen members of the Club met at the Centerville McDonald's on the brisk Saturday morning to participate in the outing. Eleven were undeterred by the 54° morning and made the short trip to Rosewood Park after some coffee, breakfast, and conversation.

Upon arrival at the park, lines were quickly dispatched into the waters of the pond. Mentor Ken Davy brought in the first aquatic resident with a splashy retrieve from the western shoreline. Before long the cry of "Fish On," could be heard from other anglers. J. D. Dukes treated Club President Paula Smith, by allowing her to use his 7' 6," 3 - weight rod he built. Paula fought through a bit of muscle memory to gain a feel for the super bendy rod, and brought 3 bluegill to hand.

The northern corner, which actually is the outflow for the pond, appeared to hold a number of fish in a fairly deep pool. Nymphing proved to be the most successful tactic utilized by the anglers. A number of laughs and flies were shared and the event was deemed to be a success.

Members of the Miami Valley Fly Fishers should be on the lookout for future "Coffee, Casting, and Catching" events throughout this fishing season.

Exercises you can do at home to help you meet onstream casting challenges



Adding Images to Forum

Casting Competition News!

Come one, come all and join us in the MVFF fly casting competition. You can test your casting skills, it's fun and we supply the equipment.

May is the dry fly competition. This year we are starting with two 4 weight rods, both left and right hand retrieve. Both with a brand spanking new double taper line and a sparkling new 9 foot leader. How about bringing one your own bright flies for the club to use.

The only thing required to participate in the casting events is for you to show up. Regardless of skill level, EVERYONE IS WELCOME!

May Casting Competition – this month will be the Dry Fly competition.

- A maximum of 3 false casts per target will be allowed.
- · We will have you start with the fly in target 1 or in your hand. (Judge's decision on meeting night.)

Casting Competitiom Cut-Off Time

Casting competition will only be from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. No casting will be allowed after 7:00 p.m. The cut-off time will help ensure we are not holding up the meeting with scoring, etc., and give us somewhat of a chance to grab some dinner. So come on over and cast early!

NOTE: If no one is casting, at the discretion of the judges, we might close as early as 6:30 p.m.

Casting Competition Divisions are as follows:

First Flight: Those that have never won a casting event and all new casters.

Seniors: Casters who have previously won a First Flight casting event or former winners of the First Flight casting division.

Masters: Former winners of the Seniors casting division.

Competition Guidelines:

Everyone will cast to the same five rings, using the club rod.

One person from each division will be determined the winner of that night's competition. Based on your cumulative scores of all the events, an overall winner will be determined for each division and presented a traveling trophy in December.

Scoring: (Judges will make the final ruling on all scores; there will be no ties for any event.)

All casters will start with 100 points.

- (-0) Those skillful enough to place the fly inside the gold ring will not lose any points.
- (-1) Any fly that lands inside the black ring will result in the deduction of 1 point.
- (-2) If the fly lands outside all the rings, 2 points will be deducted.

The person in each division with the highest score will win the event for their division.

At the end of the outdoor season, overall winners of each division will be determined by averaging scores of all events entered. Whoever has the highest score total in their division will be awarded a trophy at the December awards banquet. Even if you don't win an event, you could still be the overall winner of your division (it's happened before!). And the largest part of winning your division is consistency - that is the key. So come on over and cast.

Remember - although we do keep score and everyone would like to win, the real point of doing this (other than to just have a good time) is to improve our casting abilities.

Digital Fishing Tools

Not so many years ago, fishermen gathered at bait shops, in marinas, around cracker barrels in general stores and other, similar, meeting places. These gatherings had purposes other than passing on the latest gossip, or swapping lies. One of the best purposes of these sessions was the collection and passing down of useful information. New knots were discussed and demonstrated, the movement of fish onto the spawning grounds was reported, and new lures, rods or reels were reviewed.

The most important information was much harder to come by, that being tidbits concerning hotspots that were yielding large numbers of fish, or fish of great size. Such information has always been, and likely will always be, considered top secret information, necessary for the angler to protect at any cost, lest the spots become degraded through increased fishing pressure.

Fortunately, today there are numerous tools that can provide the angler-specific information about bodies of water, fish activity and even information about the fish you have already caught. There are geographic information systems that will help locate new places to fish or build custom maps, depth finders that can reveal the contours of a pond without the need to launch a boat, informational websites that attempt to replace the bait shops of old, and apps that pass along information on who is catching what using which baits in which bodies of water.

Over the next few months, I intend to provide my readers with reviews of some of the most popular websites and applications. When the series concludes, you should have a comprehensive view of current digital tools to aid your fishing, how to operate the tools to perform helpful functions, and pitfalls inherent to avoid in each of the tools.

May Fly of the Month



- 1. Attach the thread slightly behind the hook eye and wrap a tight thread base back to the bend of the hook, then wrap it forward again to slightly behind the hook eye. Remove any thread tag.
- 2. Cut a 4" to 5" piece of legging material and fold it half. Form a small loop (at least a hook shank in length) at the fold point and tie the legging material in behind the hook eye, on top of the hook shank, with the loop projecting in front of the hook eye. Keeping the butt ends of the legging material on top of the hook shank, wrap a tight thread base over them back to the hook bend, then wrap the thread forward again to about 1/3rd of the hook shank behind the hook eye. DO NOT CUT OFF THE REMAINING LEG MATERIAL as it will become the tail. Trim the remaining butts so that they are about the length of the hook. Insert your scissors into the material loop at the hook eye, stretch the loop forward, then cut it apart creating two antennae. Trim the antennae so that they are a little less than a hook shank in length.
- 3. Cut a 5" piece of tubing and tie it in by one end about 1/3rd of the hook shank behind the hook eye, then, keeping the tubing on top of the hook shank, make tight thread wraps over it back to the hook bend. Return the thread to the 1/3rd point, then grasp the tubing and, maintaining a little tension, wrap it in touching turns forward to the 1/3rd point and tie it off. Trim off any excess tubing.

Recipe

- 4. Now cut about 8-12 fibers from a pheasant tail and tie them in on top of the hook shank by their butt ends at the front of the tube abdomen. Trim off any excess butts. Wrap the thread over the butts back to the 1/3rd point of the hook shank, then return the thread back to behind the hook eye. The pheasant tail fibers should now be on top of the hook shank stretching back toward the hook bend.
- 5. Dub the thread creating a thin dubbing noodle and wrap it back to the wingcase tie-in point (be sure to cover all the wing case thread wraps) and then back to behind the hook eye creating a small thorax. Remove any excess dubbing. The thread should now be behind the hook eye.
- Grasp the pheasant tail fibers and pull them over the top
 of the thorax and tie them down tightly behind the hook eye.
 Trim off any excess fibers.
- 7. Form a small thread head, do a whip finish (be careful not to tie down the antennae) and cut the thread. Take a dubbing brush and brush down legs from the thorax. If desired, coat the wing case with a drop of head cement for added durability.
