

beside you, this will help you to not hook someone or catch a tree bass. Wear a life jacket if you are boating or wading. Take appropriate gear for the occasion. Our group of 13 MVFF club members made our annual fishing trip to Waterfalls Lodge in Ontario, Canada on June 1st thru June 8th this year.



It appeared the spring elements were all in our favor to hit the spring spawning run of smallmouth bass. The mild winter meant an early spring in Canada as it did for us in Ohio. If we hit if right we would have many large fish in the shallow areas on their spawning run which equals great fly rod fishing in the shallow waters.



But as Mother Nature would have it the run was even earlier than expected and most of the beds were already empty when we arrived. The overall weather was quite good for us with just a few morning showers and no major problems during the week.

As a group we landed over 800 fish during the week with the majority being smallmouth bass and there were plenty of rock bass and pike to keep things interesting as well. As usual, the outpost lakes were great fishing and the key locations on the main lakes paid off as well.

July Fly of the Month



- 1. Place the hook in the vise, then tie in the thread behind the hook eye and wrap a tight thread base back to just past the hook bend. Remove the thread tag and let the thread hang.
- 2. Cut a 4"-5" piece of chenille, strip one end down to the core, then tie it in by the core end where you left the thread.
- 3. Wrap the chenille forward toward the hook eye in tight touching turns to the middle of the hook shank forming a tapered body (bigger toward the front and smaller at the rear) and tie it off. Remove any excess chenille.
- 4. Select a marabou feather with relatively long fibers and tie it in by the tip tight against the front of the body. Remove any excess tip fibers. Stroking the marabou fibers back toward

Recipe

Hook Scud or curved caddis, size 8

Thread Olive 6/0

Weight 4-5 turns of .015 lead wire (optional) Body Olive or green Ultra Chenille, medium

Collar Olive mini marabou (regular marabou is okay too.)

Head Thread

the hook bend with each turn, wrap the marabou forward to slightly behind the hook eye and tie it off. Remove any excess marabou feather.

5. Form a small thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread. (You may, at your option apply head cement to the head thread wraps. However, a second whip finish may be a better option to avoid any chance of getting cement on the marabou and ruining the fly's action.)

Note: While this fly can used both weighted or unweighted, it is more commonly used unweighted. Fish this fly with slight twitches to simulate movement. This fly can be tied in several different shades of olive to match the local vegetation.

July Competition is the Roll Cast

The roll cast is a very important tool to have in your casting arsenal. The roll cast is one of the most used casts and a great skill to practice at home on the lawn. You want to keep a consistent length of line while you work on casting, so one can identify challenges and correct them as quickly as possible. If you are always changing our length of line, it's even more difficult to identify any possible hiccup in your cast.

To begin a roll cast, start by slowly and smoothly bringing our hand up from the rod lowered position. I suggest that your hand comes up parallel to your ear. You can do a roll cast at any angle, but this position is a good starting point to practice. Although you can roll cast at any angle, start somewhere where you can make that cast again and again, until you feel you are getting good results. It is very important to make sure that your fly line stays in contact with the water (or ground), or you may find yourself dumping your cast.

The temptation to rush and go right into the cast is *very* real and happens all the time. Go slowly, and wait with your hand at the same height as (and parallel to) your ear. Keeping these two things in mind should help to keep you from rushing, and from keeping your hand too low

Start with your hand roughly across from your ear. Have your rod slightly tilted to the side to prevent the line from wrapping around or hitting your rod during the cast making a large D-loop. Allow your hand to move straight forward toward your target. Smoothly accelerate into a flick with the rod tip stopping high around eye level or slightly above and straight out to your target.

Now watch the loop unroll above the water . . .

Two common mistakes:

- 1. Rushing right into the forward motion of the cast.
- 2. Keeping our hand low throughout the cast.

Casting Competition News!

Come one, come all and join us in the MVFF fly casting competition. You can test your casting skills, it's fun and we supply the equipment. This year we are starting with two 4 weight rods, both left and right hand retrieve. Both with a brand spanking new double taper line and a sparkling new 9 foot leader. How about bringing one of your own bright flies for the club to use.

The only thing required to participate in the casting events is for you to show up. Regardless of skill level, EVERYONE IS WELCOME!

July Casting Competition - this month will be the Roll Cast competition using a club 7 wt. rod. Limit of 15 casts total.

- Start with fly in target #1. Cast to target #1 until scored (inside one of the rings).
- Then on to the remaining 4 targets or until a maximum of 15 casts are made.
- · Any target not scored is a demerit of -2 points. Highest score with fewest casts wins.

Casting Competition Cut-Off Time

Casting competition will only be from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. No casting will be allowed after 7:00 p.m. The cut-off time will help ensure we are not holding up the meeting with scoring, etc., and give us somewhat of a chance to grab some dinner. So come on over and cast early!

NOTE: If no one is casting, at the discretion of the judges, we might close as early as 6:30 p.m.

Casting Competition Divisions are as follows:

First Flight: Those that have never won a casting event and all new casters.

Seniors: Casters who have previously won a First Flight casting event or former winners of the First Flight casting division.

Masters: Former winners of the Seniors casting division.

Competition Guidelines:

Everyone will cast to the same five rings, using the club rod.

One person from each division will be determined the winner of that night's competition. Based on your cumulative scores of all the events, an overall winner will be determined for each division and presented a traveling trophy in December.

Scoring: (Judges will make the final ruling on all scores; there will be no ties for any event.)

All casters will start with 100 points.

- (-0) Those skillful enough to place the fly inside the gold ring will not lose any points.
- (-1) Any fly that lands inside the black ring will result in the deduction of 1 point.
- (-2) If the fly lands outside all the rings, 2 points will be deducted.

The person in each division with the highest score will win the event for their division.

At the end of the outdoor season, overall winners of each division will be determined by averaging scores of all events entered. Whoever has the highest score total in their division will be awarded a trophy at the December awards banquet. Even if you don't win an event, you could still be the overall winner of your division (it's happened before!). And the largest part of winning your division is consistency - that is the key. So come on over and cast.

Remember - although we do keep score and everyone would like to win, the real point of doing this (other than to just have a good time) is to improve our casting abilities.
