Fly Tying Classes

Introductory and beginning fly tying classes will be Thursday nights from 6-8:00 p.m. at the Rona Hills Community Church on January 9, 16, 23, 30 and February 6 hosted by J.D. Dukes with possible guest instructors.

We also have an extraordinary opportunity to present a western fly tying course taught by member Emily Reeves who grew up in Colorado and began fly fishing and tying with her father at age 4. She will be hosting



classes at the same venue on February 13, 20, and 27. This course is for those tiers who are more experienced. She will be leaving us late next spring for a new Air Force assignment.

Winter Practice

For many folks, winter means less time on the water and more time at home. You may find some solace in thinking about adventures to come – what you want to do, where you want to go, and how you can prepare for the future on the water now.

Start with the basics. If you can get outside, work on your short game: casts of 20 to 30 feet.

Break the cast down by dividing your casting motion into a very distinct forward cast and back cast, which lets you focus on each piece of the puzzle more directly. The easiest way to make this happen is to cast at a side-arm angle also known as the triangle method.

- 1. Make a forward cast, let it lie on the ground.
- 2. Check to see if it's landing straight.

3. Gather yourself and then make a backcast at that same side-arm angle, watching the loop unroll all the way back.

- 4. Check to see if the line lands straight.
- 5. Make the next forward cast and repeat the process.

6. Only after these two pieces feel pretty good and are landing nicely, link them together. Instead of letting your backcast hit the ground, start your forward cast after the line straightens out in the air. Let the forward cast land on the ground and see your results.

You're looking to keep the loops less than 4 feet.

December Fly of the Month





1. Place the hook in the vise and tie in the thread behind the hook eye at the point where the folded end of the hook eye touches the hook shank and wrap a tight thread base back over the front half of the hook shank, then reverse direction and wrap the thread back to the tie-in point. Let the thread hang.

2. Cut a 2" piece of poly yarn and tie it in by its middle on top of the hook shank at the thread tie-in point with several tight thread wraps. Lift up both ends of the yarn and wrap thread around them up their length for about 1/4" forming a tight thread post, then wrap the thread back down to the base of the post.

3. Select a hackle feather and measure the barb fibers to find the point where the barbs are the length of the hook shank. Strip off the longer fibers below that point exposing the bare quill. The the feather in by its bare quill upright against the side of the thread post with tight thread wraps. (The barbs should start at the top of the post.) Return the thread to the base of the post, trim off any excess quill butt, and wrap the thread back to the hook bend.

4. Cut a strip of foam about ¹/4" wide and 4" long. Cut a taper in one end and tie it in by this tapered end on top of the hook shank (Be sure the straight side of the tapered end is on top.). The length of the strip should project out over the hook bend. Bind down the butt end of the strip with tight thread wraps. Wrap the thread back to behind the post.

Lee Wulff Surface Stone Variant

Recipe

Hook	Salmon, size 6
Thread	Chartreuse, 6/0
Post	Poly yarn, white or color of your choice
Hackle	Saddle hackle, badger or cream
Body	Chartreuse foam, 2mm
Wing	Badger hair or Grey Squirrel tail
Thorax	Chartreuse Diamond Brite or Prism dubbing
	blended with badger hair underfur

5. If desired for durability, coat the hook shank with super glue, then wrap the foam strip up the hook shank in overlapping turns to slightly behind the post and tie it off. Be sure to keep tension on the foam strip as you wrap it to form a thin body. Remove any excess foam and tie down the butt with tight thread wraps.

6. Snip a small clump of badger hair or squirrel tail hair from the skin. (Pull the hair upright to even the tips before you cut it off as close to the skin as possible.) Remove all the underfur but don't throw it away as we will use it later. Measure the hair to be the length of the hook shank and tie it in tightly by the butts as a wing on top of the hook shank slightly behind the post and tightly against the front of the foam abdomen. Wrap tight thread wraps over the hair butts to the back of the post, then pull the remaining hair butts around the side of the post toward the hook eye and cover them with thread wraps. Wrap the thread back to behind the post to the wing tie-in point.

7. Take a clump of dubbing and blend it with the underfur from step 6, then dub the thread and wrap it from the front of the wing to the back of the post. Be sure to cover any thread wraps. Remove any excess dubbing and wrap the thread to the front of the post.

8. Now grasp the hackle feather and wrap it down the post in tight touching turns to the hook shank and tie it off in front of the post. Remove any excess hackle. Dub the thread again and x-wrap it behind the post to cover any thread wraps, then bend back the post and wrap the dubbed thread against the front of the post forming a dubbed tapered head.

9. Remove any excess dubbing, form a small thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread. Apply head cement if desired.

10. Trim the top of the post level just above the hackle.

Preparing Your Gear for Winter

Many of us seldom fish in the winter months and for some the focus shifts to fly tying. If you are among the majority here, you might consider how to care for and store all that precious gear so that it's in tip-top shape come next season.

Storing fly fishing gear properly over the winter ensures it remains in excellent condition and is ready for use when the fishing season resumes. Here are some best practices:

- 1. Rods
- Clean Thoroughly: Use warm water and mild soap to remove dirt, grime, and any salt residue.
- Dry Completely: Ensure the rod is completely dry to prevent moisture-related damage.
- Disassemble: If the rod is multi-piece, separate the sections and store them in their protective case or sock.
- Avoid Stress: Store rods horizontally or vertically in a cool, dry place. Avoid leaning them at angles or placing heavy items on them.
- 2. Reels
 - Clean and Lubricate: Rinse reels with fresh water, especially if used in saltwater, and dry thoroughly. Apply a light reel grease to moving parts.
 - Loosen Drag: Reduce tension on the drag system to avoid compressing internal components during storage.
- Store Safely: Place the reel in a protective pouch or case to prevent dust and physical damage.
- 3. Lines
 - Inspect for Damage: Check fly lines for cracks or wear.
 - Clean and Condition: Use a fly line cleaner to remove dirt and improve performance.
 - Loosely Coil: Store fly lines loosely in a cool, dry place to prevent kinking or memory.
- 4. Flies
- Dry Completely: Ensure all flies are dry before storage to avoid rust on hooks.
- Sort and Organize: Arrange flies by type or size in a fly box.
- Inspect Hooks: Replace or sharpen damaged hooks.
- 5. Waders and Boots
 - Clean Thoroughly: Wash waders and boots with warm water and a mild detergent to remove mud, algae, or invasive species.
 - Dry Completely: Hang waders and boots to air dry, ensuring no moisture is trapped inside.
 - Store Properly: Hang waders by the suspenders or fold them loosely. Store boots in a cool, dry place.
- 6. Accessories
 - Clean Tools: Inspect and clean nippers, forceps, and other tools to remove rust or dirt.
 - Organize Gear: Store small items in tackle boxes or zip-lock bags to keep them organized.
- 7. Storage Conditions
 - Avoid Extremes: Store gear in a cool, dry place away from direct sunlight and temperature extremes.
 - Protect from Pests: Use cedar blocks or moth repellents to deter insects that might damage natural materials like feathers or furs.

By taking the time to properly store your fly fishing gear, you'll extend its lifespan and ensure it's ready to perform when the season begins again.
