Indoor Casting Event – February 15th

Our next indoor casting event will be on February 15th from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. at the Xenia Community Center, 1265 W. 2nd Street, Xenia.

We will continue with the Foundation Level Skills. These are all skills that one needs to master to become a better caster.

Foundation Level Skills

F1. Assemble Gear: All fly fishers must be able to properly assemble gear. Assemble the rod, attach the reel, line the rod and get about 1 rod length of fly line past the rod tip, and straighten the leader.

F2. Feeling the Line: Pancakes, Eggs, and Bacon: With the fly at 20-25 ft., the angler will move the near-vertical rod in a clockwise circle forming "pancakes." After about 6-8 revolutions, move the rod in a clockwise oval (eggs) for another 6-8 revolutions. Finally, make the oval narrower back to front until the rod is moving nearly straight forward and then back (bacon).

F3. Horizontal Loop Formation Drill: Starting with the fly at 25 ft. the angler moves the rod in a horizontal plane (rod is parallel to the ground) with smooth acceleration through the right size arc to an abrupt stop causing loop formation. Line and leader are allowed to fall to the ground and should be relatively straight. The goal is to create a narrow, casting loop with 4 ft. or less distance between fly and rod leg. The horizontal plane this allows easy observation of the forward and back cast loops which should be nearly identical. **This is also a great drill to do with longer bits of line.**

F4. Horizontal False Casting Drill: Starting with the fly at 25 ft. the angler makes the same horizontal casting motion but does not allow the line/leader to fall. The angler must pause just long enough to allow the line to straighten, but not fall to the ground, before the next cast. Narrow loop formation (4 ft. or less fly to rod leg) is still the goal. Nope: **When practiced with longer lengths of line, a bit longer pause is needed.**

F5. Climb the Wall: Starting with the fly at 25 ft. the angler will start with horizontal false casting with narrow loops and raise the rod tip in 10-20 degree increments up toward a near-vertical casting position. Narrow loops are maintained throughout. Once an angle close to vertical is reached, the caster will work back down to horizontal in like fashion.

F6. Cast to Targets: There are two targets, both 30 ft. from the angler but 20 ft apart. Starting with the fly at one target, the angler uses a series of near-vertical false casts to change direction to the other target. The fly should land within 2 ft. of the center of the targets.

F7. 35 ft. Lob or Water Tension Cast: Starting with the fly stretched to 30 ft. behind the angler, a lob or water tension cast is made with a crisp forward stop so the line/leader land relatively straight 180 degrees from where it started.

We also have the room to set up most of the Bronze level casts.

Bronze Level Skills are as follows:

B1. 35 ft. Pick Up and Lay Down (PULD) Cast, Dominant Side: Starting with the fly at 35 ft. the angler will do a PULD cast in a nearly vertical plane (no false casting or hauling) returning the fly to within 2 ft. of the center of the 35 ft. target.

B2. 35 ft. PULD Cast, Non-Dominant Side: Starting with the fly at 35 ft. the angler will do a PULD cast with the rod tip and line traveling over the non-dominant shoulder, (no false casting or hauling) returning the fly to within 2 ft. of the center of the 35 ft. target.

B3. 35 ft. Horizontal PULD Cast: Starting with the fly at 35 ft. the angler will perform a PULD in a nearly horizontal plane (no higher than 2 o'clock) with the fly landing within 4 ft. of either side of the tape. The leader must not pile but may be curved. (No false casting or hauling)

Indoor Casting (cont'd)

B4. Shooting Line to 40 ft.: Starting with the fly at 40 ft. the angler will strip the fly back to 35 ft. The angler will cast and shoot the line to 40 ft. No more than 3 false casts are allowed but slipping/shooting line is only allowed on delivery. The fly must land within 2 ft. of a 40 ft. target.

B5. Accuracy to 25 and 35 ft. Targets: Starting with the fly at 40 ft. the angler strips the fly to approximately 20 ft. The angler must now achieve targets at 25 ft. and 35 ft. on the tape. The line will be lengthened during false casting between targets. The fly must land within 2 feet of the center of the target. If a target is missed the angler picks up where the fly has landed and tries again but has only 3 tries for each target. Angler must achieve both targets. No hauling.

B6. Minimum 35 ft. Roll Cast, Dominant Side: Starting with the fly at 35 ft. or more, the angler will perform a roll cast with line/leader landing relatively straight and within 2 ft. of either side of the tape. The D loop (back loop) should be formed by slowly dragging the line into position such that the fly and leader do not leave the water surface or grass. A roll cast tool is suggested if performed on grass or indoors. No hauling.

B7. Distance to 50+ ft.

Starting with the fly at about 55 ft. the angler will strip the fly back to 35 ft. A cast is made to 50 ft. or more with the fly landing within 4 ft. of either side of the tape and leader relatively straight. False casting, hauling, and shooting are allowed.



Fish Every Cast

The key point of his article is to emphasize that regardless of how good or poor a cast is, if the fly hits the water, fish it!

Justin is a guide, and he opens the article by saying, "Just about every day that I spend on the water with a client, I'll find myself, at some point, explaining to them the reasons why I want them to fish each and every cast to the very end. Flies only catch fish when they are on, or in, the water. All too often we all lay our fly on the water and immediately rip it off the surface to make another, hopefully better, presentation. This is a major mistake.

• For one, the act of landing flies on the water and then ripping them off creates noises, ripples, and splashes which can either spook fish, or at least alert them that something's going on. If the fly hits the water, leave it and let it drift out of the run, or at least well downstream of the fish, before picking it up.

• Secondly, take your time and regroup. Yanking your flies from the water only to cast again without changing anything isn't likely to make the next presentation any more successful. Take time to adjust before recasting. Change your position, check your distance, maximize your chances to make your next cast better or more on target.

• The third thing that I emphasize is the "you never know" factor that is always there. Just because you think you've made a crappy cast doesn't mean it will have crappy results. Fish don't know that you just made lackluster cast. And that presentation just may lead to a hook-up.

Making an awful cast is just part of the game. We all do it, but sometimes those "awful" casts can produce some amazing results. So, even if you're certain that a presentation is a dud, it is best to let it go to save you some grief. Let each drift play out and view each cast as a learning experience. Use them to adjust for the next presentation and you'll be more successful on the water."

February Fly of the Month

Two Bit Hooker



1. Place 2 beads on the hook and slide them up to the hook eye, then place the hook in the vise. Start the thread (red) behind to beads and wrap it back to the hook bend, forming a tight thread base.

2. Tie in 4-5 hen feather fibers at the hook bend as a tail. (The tail should be ½ the hook shank in length.) Keeping the fiber butts on top of the hook shank, wrap thread forward over them to the back of the beads. Remove any excess fiber butts. Let the thread hang.

3. Cut a 6" piece of black thread and tie it in by one end behind the beads with the length of it going back toward the hook bend. Keeping the black thread (ribbing) on top of the hook shank, wrap the red thread over it back to the hook bend. DO NOT CUT THE REMAINING BLACK THREAD AS IT WILL BE THE RIB.

4. Now wrap the red thread forward to the back of the beads, creating a slightly tapered thread abdomen as you go.

5. Take the black thread and wrap it forward over the abdomen in evenly spaced turns and tie it off behind the beads. Remove any excess black thread

6. Tie in a 2"-3" piece of tinsel by one end on top of the hook shank right behind the beads and wrap thread over it

Recipe

Hook Wet, size 18-22 Beads Two to match hook size Thread Red, 6/0 or 8/0 Rib Black thread, 6/0 Thorax Rusty dubbing Flashback Flat tinsel, pearl Legs Hen hackle fibers, brown Tail Hen hackle fibers, brown

back to about 1/4" behind the beads. The length of the tinsel should be extending back over the hook bend. Let the thread hang.

7. Dub the thread and wrap it back to behind the beads forming a dubbed thorax, then slip the dubbed thread over the backmost bead and fill in the space between the two beads with dubbing. Remove any excess dubbing and let the thread hang between the beads.

8. Select a clump of hen back fibers and separate them into two bunches.

 Tie one bunch in on either side of the hook shank between the two beads with several tight wraps of thread. The fibers should extend back to about the hook point. Remove any excess fiber butts and let the thread hang.

10. Now bring the tinsel forward and tie it off between the two beads with 2-3 tight wraps of thread. Trim off any excess tinsel.

11. Do a whip finish and cut the thread.

12. Coat the top of the flashback with epoxy or UV resin as an option.

Fly Tying Classes

The 2025 introductory and beginning fly tying classes are well underway. They are held on Thursday nights from 6-8:00 p.m. at the Rona Hills Community Church and run through February 6th. They are hosted by JD Dukes.

The western fly tying course will begin on February 13th and run three consecutive Thursdays. This class will be taught by MVFF member Emily Reeves who grew up in Colorado and began fly fishing and tying with her father at age 4. This course is is for those tiers who are more experienced. She will be leaving us late next spring for a new Air Force assignment.
